DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The headquarters for the Fredericktown Bank and Trust Company is a recently built building in the Federal style. It is three stories high and five bays wide on the front. Its chief materials are rose brick laid in Flemish bond with white marble and wood painted tan for trim.

On the sidewalk are low brick planters to either side of the entrance arcade with moulded brick edges. Starting above these, there are brick quoins at all corners.

At the first floor level on the front are Roman arches in the three center bays with one window to either side. These arches are supported on plain brick piers but these have a speckled gray stone base on them which carries around the whole of the outer vestibule inside the arcade. There is brick around the arches with marble keystones. Inside the outer vestibule are three double doorways with fanlights over them. To either side are two windows, one is a wood double hung with 8/12 and the other is a walk-up teller's window. The windows on this floor at the front are wood double hung with 8/12 sash. They have marble sills and jack arch lintels with brick voussoirs and marble keystones.

At the second and third floor levels are five windows identical to those described at the first floor. Above the third story window lintels is a wood cornice with consoles for modillions. The roof on the main part of the bank is a hipped roof with slate shingles.

To the north of the main building is a small wing connecting the building physically (though not internally) with the neighboring Hendrickson building. This is a single story wing with one window on the front matching those on the main building and a similar cornice, scaled down, of course.

The south elevation of the building is also important as it can be seen from a thoroughfare to the rear of the bank property. This roadway has a pair of handsome wrought iron gates at its front. The facade on this side consists of a single bay near the front corner, four bays in a break about two ft. forward from the initial wall surface, and a final single bay at the rear in which is placed the drive-up teller's window. All the first floor windows (the drive-up window being excluded, of course) have arched heads with divided glazing in them. Below the arch is an 8/12 sash window. The arches have brick surrounds with marble keystones. The second and third story windows are all double hung with 8/12 sash matching those on the front facade in their sills and lintels. The same cornice as on the front carries around to this elevation.
