113-117 West Patrick Street is a two and one half story brick building laid in flemish bond on the south elevation and common bond on remaining visible elevations.

The building is six bays wide and three bays deep with an ell shaped two story brick wing one bay square with rear balcony. The first floor wall is constructed of rubble stone. The entire first floor of the main block of the building has been altered to accommodate an automobile agency and is now faced with granite, large show windows and a large driveway where originally an archway led to the rear of the building according to deeds. This driveway leads to a large two story concrete block garage to the rear with collapsed roof.

The second story front has 6/6 sash with flat brick arches. The entire facade was sandblasted approximately ten years ago.

The rooflines rest on three string brick cornices on the front and rear with the front one being of moulded convex and concave bricks which is unusual in Frederick.

119-121 West Patrick Street is a two and one half story brick building laid in flemish bond on the principal elevation and common bond on the remaining elevations.

The principal facade is eight bays wide. A three bay wide two story brick wing in bad condition extends to the rear of the northwest side. This addition was built in the late part of the nineteenth century. The entire first floor of the building has been altered like 113-117 West Patrick to accommodate an automobile agency and is faced with granite and large show windows. A two story cinder block garage extends to the rear. The second floor front has 6/6 sash with flat brick arches and wood sills.

The building is covered by an asphalt gable roof with simple cornice and flat shaped modillions.

Although much of the interior woodworking has been removed, some fine rounded paneled and shouldered architrave molding over doors and windows remains in the front, west, and center second floor rooms of this building.

133 West Patrick St. is a tall narrow two story brick commercial building laid in common bond, three bays wide and four bays deep. The entire building was sandblasted approximately ten years ago.

The first floor of the building was altered to accommodate a three window unit with small panes divided by plain pilasters with panels above and below in pseudo-colonial styling.

The second floor front windows are of 6/6 segmentally topped sashes with flat hooded cornices supported by the above mentioned brackets and decorated with floral scrolls in the arch infill areas and with incised key blocks centering each window. The front roof cornice is supported by similar brackets with segmental panels of floral scrolls and centered key blocks between the brackets as over the windows.

A one story cement block addition surrounds and extends the wing.

Black Horse Tavern and Hertz Building

Two federal style buildings located at 113-121 West Patrick Street contribute significantly to the streetscape. Both buildings predate most of the mid nineteenth century buildings in the area.

Despite numerous alterations, both buildings have retained much original architectural detailing including interior moldings, a marble fireplace added after the construction of the building, and stepped brick cornice.

The buildings were built at different times. According to title searches, 119-121 stood in its present location by 1797 when it was described as a three story brick house and lot. The building served as Levy's Tavern in the first half of the nineteenth century and recently was mistaken for the Black Horse Tavern by local historians.

The building at 113-117 was probably built around 1817 when it was purchased by the Kimball family who owned it for almost twenty years.

The two story brick commercial building at 133 West Patrick Street was built in the third quarter of the nineteenth century and is typical of many located within the city. The most interesting architectural features are the second floor windows decorated with flat hooded cornices supported by brackets with fluting and incised triangular endings and floral scrolls in the arch infill areas in incised key blocks centering each window. The front roof cornice is supported by similar brackets with segmental panels of floral scrolls and centered key blocks between the brackets as over the windows.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a tall, two story brick detached former townhouse, approximately four bays square with an "L" shaped wing three bays wide and four bays deep with the remains of a former side balcony. Front brickwork has recently been restored and all is in common bond. The entranceway occupies the right bay with a recessed door of small panes. In the three bays to the left is an attractive three window unit with small panes and divided by plain pilasters with panels above and below in a colonial styling. Above this unit and the doorway are simple cornices supported by Victorian brackets with fluting and incised triangular endings, the same design as used over the second floor front windows and the roof cornice. The second floor front windows are of 6/6 segmentally topped sashes with flat hooded cornices supported by the above mentioned brackets and decorated with floral scrolls in the arch infill areas and with incised key blocks centering each window. The front roof cornice is supported by similar brackets with segmental panels of floral scrolls and centered key blocks between the brackets as over the windows. The rear area has been mutilated by commercial endeavors over the years and the few remaining windows are of 2/2 sash with wood lintels and sills and there is a board and batten former balcony door. A one story cement block addition surrounds and extends the wing. The roof of the front section slopes to the rear and the wing has a shed roof, both of metal. The building has a low foundation.
