




DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE



This is a three story brick attached pair of houses six bays wide and approximately three bays deep with a two story brick "T" shaped wing four bays wide and five small bays in depth with #34 retaining a side balcony. All brickwork is of common bond and #32 has been recently restored displaying a light red shade of brick. The front facade is truly the ultimate of Victorian craftsmanship and millwork. Both houses possess the same features but different in arrangement for individuality with #34 giving the illusion of being wider. Front entranceways occupy the right bay of #34 and off center of #32 with four panel doors headed by round arched transoms. These are framed by pilasters having attached pillars on round attached pedestals with the transom areas framed by angled, attached pillars with pointed pendant capitals and the whole crowned by pyramidal canopies. To the left of these are two story bay windows with small, round arched windows on the first floor and segmental arched windows on the second story. These bay window sections are very elaborately trimmed by super-imposed ballustrades of turned banisters below the windows, recessed panels of diagonal crossed stickwork and dropped panels with bay windows and wall sections at the base of the mansard roof with first floor patterns repeated such as brackets with small angled pillars, dropped panels, and roundels and narrow, horizontal pointed panels . There are enclosed passageways with board and batten gates in the  end bays. Additional second story front windows are narrow with segmental brick arches, and all those on the first and second stories are of 1/1 sash. The front third story mansard roof section is gambriiled and covered with hexagonal-shaped slates decorated by red floral sections. The third story is lighted by protruding wide 8/2 sash windows above the bay windows headed by flat topped pediments and with small 4/1 sash windows to the right on #32 and on either side on #34. These windows are framed by grooved pilasters and the mansard section is framed by deep mouldings. Rear area windows are of small 2/2 sash with wood lintels and sills with louvered shutters and #34 has a double window with pairs of narrow hinged paneled shutters. Original doors have been replaced. The front section roof slopes to the rear and the wing has a low "A" frame, all of metal. The houses rest on a low foundation. There are rear brick or concrete patios.
