Description of Property and Justification: *(Please attach map and photo)*

Physical Description

The Thomas P. McKenzie Farm is located on the east side of Old Frostburg Road (former Beall School Road) about one mile south of the intersection of U.S. Route 40 in Garrett County, Maryland. The property consists of a two-story dwelling, bank barn, springhouse, two sheds, and a garage.

Dwelling, c. 1900

The dwelling is a two-story four-bay wood-frame house constructed circa 1900 upon a stone and poured concrete foundation, clad in aluminum siding, and capped with a corrugated metal side gable roof. A two-story wood-frame ell addition is appended to the rear (east) elevation, and a one-story shed roof addition is appended to the north elevation of the ell addition and rear (east) elevation of the main block. The façade (west elevation) features a one-story hipped roof porch that has recently been enclosed and clad with vinyl siding. Fenestration consists of one-over-one double-hung sash replacement windows and a modern tripartite window unit on the north elevation.

The Thomas P. McKenzie House has been heavily altered, as the original windows have been replaced, the exterior cladding has been covered and replaced with modern materials, and the porch has been enclosed. An interior brick chimney also likely once

pierced the roof of the main block, but it is no longer extant. A previous 1981 survey describes the residence as having two entrances on the façade, but this is no longer visible with the enclosure of the porch, and it is unknown whether the two entrances remain. The dwelling currently stands in fair to poor condition.

Barn, c. 1900

A wood-frame bank barn is located to the south of the dwelling. It is clad in vertical wood boards and capped with a gable roof covered in corrugated metal. A hay elevator is located on the west elevation of the barn. The barn stands in fair condition.

Shed #1, c. 1900

A small wood-frame shed stands immediately north of the dwelling. The shed is clad in vertical wood boards and capped with a gable roof covered in deteriorating plywood. Shed #1 currently stands in poor condition.

Shed #2, c. 1900

A rectangular one-story wood-frame shed stands to the south of the dwelling. The shed is clad in vertical wood boards and capped with a corrugated metal side gable roof. Shed #2 currently stands in good to fair condition.

Barn, c. 1900

A wood-frame bank barn is located to the south of Shed #2. It is clad in vertical wood boards and capped with a gable roof covered in corrugated metal. A hay elevator is located on the west elevation of the barn. The barn stands in fair condition.

Springhouse, c. 1900

A one-story springhouse is located to the west of the dwelling near a dirt driveway. The springhouse is not easily visible from the right-of-way, as it is located in a ditch or depression. The springhouse appears to be a wood-frame structure capped with a metal gable roof.

Garage, c. 1950

Southwest of the dwelling stands a circa-1950 concrete block garage clad in the gables with vertical wood boards and capped with a front gable roof covered in metal. The west elevation features a large sliding bay door. The garage currently stands in poor condition.

History and Significance

The first Europeans began to arrive in the area around Avilton, Maryland in the mid-eighteenth century. There is little record of those who settled in the area first, as they did not file patents or commission surveys, but built cabins and cleared small portions of land. However, after the Revolutionary War development in the area greatly expanded. The forests that covered the mountains were slowly but surely cleared. Pine forests largely made up the land between Savage and Negro Mountains, with a few other varieties like spruce and hemlock intermixed (Brown 1896:54). These large wood-covered miles attracted many hunters to the area, including Meshach Browning, who wrote a book about the many years he spent living as a pioneer in the area around Avilton and directly west. Hunters like Browning who populated the area used the National Road, which was constructed through the area in the early nineteenth century, to get their hides and meats back to eastern markets (Browning 1942:195). While the hunters settled early, it was not long before additional lots were readied for settlement. Many of the earliest lots in the area were surveyed for veterans of the Revolutionary War. Some of these lots went to men like Thomas Johnson, who eventually became Governor of Maryland. There were also land speculators who made their mark on the area, including men like Brooke Beall and William Deakins (Rowland 2009:39).

The earliest land records of the area typically consist of people with large tracts of land selling those tracts to other speculators. But, starting in the mid-1800s that began to change, as smaller portions of land were sold off, and more and more farms were raised in the valleys between the mountains. As land was freshly cleared, many farmers from east of the Appalachians began to plant tobacco. However, they learned quickly that the soil was made too poor by tobacco farming in this area (Brown 1896:300). The settlement that would later become Avilton was originally known as "The McKenzie Settlement" for the many numbers of Scottish immigrants, particularly McKenzies, who settled there. The early farmers of this area grew primarily wheat, rye, oats and potatoes. A partial listing of the founding families of this area was included in Garrett County: A History of Maryland's Tableland and includes: Garlitz, Blocher, Wilhelm, Broadwater, Miller, Crowe and Merrill among others. By 1885, the area was known as Avilton, and a post office was opened under that name (Schlosnagle 1978:65).

In the second half of the nineteenth century, railroads made their way through Garrett County, connecting the area like never before. As the railroads arrived, the many pine forests that surrounded area farms were looked at with a new sense of their value. While they had been used as a source of building materials for years, the forests were now logged and the timber was shipped to larger markets on the railroad. On Savage Mountain, it was the Juniata Lumber Company that took advantage of the fine timber of the area (Brown 1896:264,275). Increasingly, the agricultural area was dotted throughout by people who worked in the industry. As Jacob Brown described the area "she grew from a county of crude backwoods settlements and small self-sufficient farms to a county of coal towns, timber towns, resort towns, trade towns, and increasingly fertile fields and meadows (Brown 1896:304)." While the area was still largely rural, times were slowly changing.

By the first half of the twentieth century, more and more people were working both on their farms and in various industries. By the 1940 Census, many household heads were listed as working in mining or timbering, while it is also indicated that many continued to pursue agriculture (Ancestry.com). While they produced goods for local markets, the demands of an increasingly connected society drew more and more residents off their farms. The effects of the great depression were also seen in the 1940 Census of the area, with many people listed as road builders or general laborers who were employed in emergency government work (Ancestry.com). After World War II, some farms began to not be used for agriculture. This has led to the decline of some of the properties, and the destruction of others. Many families, descendants of the original settlers at McKenzie Settlement, continue to use the fields around Avilton to raise cows and some grains, continuing some of the traditions that were started so many years ago.

The Thomas P. McKenzie Farm is located on the east side of Old Frostburg Road west of Frostburg in eastern Garrett County. The area comprising and surrounding the property is largely woodland and agricultural fields. The property is comprised of several parcels of land, many of which were purchased by Thomas P. McKenzie between 1937 and 1949. While no plat maps exist that show the location of the extant dwellings in reference to the parcels, it is likely that the dwelling and outbuildings are located on a 35-acre parcel of land once owned by Thomas McKenzie's father Lewis Joseph McKenzie based on the legal description and United States Federal Census records.

The earliest deed reference that could be found for the parcel containing the extant buildings of the Thomas P. McKenzie Farm is from June 18, 1892, when Lewis Joseph McKenzie purchased 80 acres of land from Richard and Susan Beall (Garrett County Deed Book 20:231). The 80-acre property consists of parts of several tracts, including "John's Prospect," "Pine Grove," and "Water Works." Richard Beall is listed in the 1860, 1870, and 1880 United States Federal Census records as being a lumberman and residing in Frostburg, Allegany County, with his wife Susan and their family. The indices of the Allegany and Garrett County Land Records indicate that Richard and Susan Beall bought and sold several tracts of land throughout their lives, and it is not clear when or from whom they purchased the 80-acre property they sold to Lewis Joseph McKenzie. While they likely never resided on the property, Richard Beall probably harvested timber from the land. Richard Beall died in 1892, and the 1900 United States Federal Census lists Susan Beall as the keeper of a summer boarding house.

Lewis Joseph McKenzie was born to Isadore McKenzie and Harriett Garlitz in Garrett County in March 1863 (United States Census Bureau 1870). By 1910 he had married Mary O. McKenzie and the two had seven children. Lewis McKenzie was a farmer, and owned his own farm (United States Census Bureau 1910). By 1920, Lewis Joseph McKenzie had retired, and left the running of the farm to his son, James F. McKenzie. Most of the buildings on the property were built during Lewis Joseph McKenzie's ownership of the property. The property next changed hands after Lewis Joseph McKenzie's death in 1934 (FindAGrave 2009). In 1937, his heirs sold the property to one of his sons, Thomas P. McKenzie.

Between 1937 and 1949, Thomas P. McKenzie purchased and combined several parcels of land. On August 10, 1937, he purchased the 35-acre property, including the dwelling and extant agricultural buildings, from his father's estate (Garrett County Deed Book 161:300). Thomas P. McKenzie was born in 1905 to Lewis Joseph and Mary O. McKenzie. In 1930, while living in his father's house with his wife, Nellie, he worked his father's farm, and rented space in the house for five dollars a month (United States Census Bureau 1930). By 1940, Thomas was forced to seek work off the farm. He is listed as a government worker, though not in emergency work. He collected a salary of \$350 and worked in highway construction. He had four sons, Ralph, Alfred, Lafe David, and two daughters, Thelma and Martha. He was working on the farm as well at this time, because he is also recorded on the agricultural census (United State Census Bureau 1940). Thomas P. McKenzie died in 1991, and was buried in St. Ann's Cemetery, which is located in part of what was historically known as the McKenzie Settlement (FindAGrave 2011). Thomas P. McKenzie maintained the farm that he had purchased from his father's estate, and kept it viable for its next owners. On September 29, 1977, Thomas P. and Nellie L. McKenzie finally sold their farm to relatives Olin and Roger McKenzie who own the property today.

NRHP Evaluation

The Thomas P. McKenzie Farm is a part of the agricultural context of eastern garrett County. While it is a part of that context, it is not significant within that context. The agricultural practices on the farm were in the same vein as many other small farmers in the area, and the collection of outbuildings is not unique nor indicatie of an important agricultural practice. As such, this resource is recommended not eligible for NRHP listing under Criterion A. The property and dwelling are associated with Thomas P. Mackenzie, who lived in the residence from his birth in 1905 until at least the late 1970s. Local historical and genealogical sources provide little information relating to Thomas P. McKenzie, and there is no evidence that any individuals associated with the property were significant in local, state, or national history. Therefore, the resource is recommended not eligible for NRHP listing under Criterion B. The Thomas P. McKenzie Farm stands as a common and heavily altered example of early-twentieth-century vernacular architecture in rural Maryland. The application of asbestos siding, modern additions, and a modern enclosed porch diminish the dwelling's historical character and integrity. As such, the resource no longer maintains integrity of design, materials, workmanship, and feeling, and is therefore recommended not eligible for NRHP listing under Criterion C. Eligibility under Criterion D cannot be determined as this resource has not undergone archaeological testing.






