The David Warnick House is a two story, gable-roofed, frame building on a foundation of coursed, roughly squared stone. Its basic configuration is an ell-plan with a three bay by one by one bay main block and a two bay rear wing. The facade has a symmetrical three bay, center door arrangement that is sheltered by a hip-roofed porch supported by four turned posts with jigsaw brackets. A two story, bay window occupies the southeast endwall. 2/2 sash windows with molded, pedimented lintels light all elevations. The three gable ends are pierced by circular vents with a jigsaw star motif. German siding sheathes the exterior.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The David Warnick House is located on the northeast side of Westernport Road approximately .9 mile northwest of Swamp Road. The area is quite mountainous, the house being situated between a steep rise known as The Elbow and the ridge of Elbow Mountain. The facade points southwest, toward the road.

The house is a frame, two story, gable-roofed building on a coursed, roughly squared stone foundation. Its basic configuration is an ell-plan with a 3 bay by 1 bay main block and a 2 bay by 1 bay rear wing. The facade has a symmetrical, three bay, center door arrangement. The window and door openings on all other elevations are evenly spaced, as well. A two story bay window occupies the southeast endwall. Hipped roof porches shelter the facade, the rear, and the northwest side of the rear wing.

The exterior walls are covered by German siding with cornerboards. Two over two sash windows light the building on all elevations. The windows are surrounded by molded boards that consist of an astragal flanked by flattened ogees, and are topped by molded, flat lintels with central pediments. Its doors have similar surrounds, the facade door having a transom light as well as the pedimented lintel. Circular ventilation panels with a jigsaw star motif pierce all three gable ends.

The roof is covered with corrugated metal and has a narrow box cornice with partial gable end returns and a plain board frieze. A brick stove chimney is located on the ridgeline of the main block just southeast of center, and another identical one is located on the ridgeline between the main block and the rear wing.

The facade porch, which has a new concrete block foundation, is supported by four turned posts and two pilasters with jigsaw brackets. The rear porch has been screened and the northwest porch has two square post supports.

The interior is a two room, center hall plan with a one room rear wing. The stairway is a 13 tread, straight run with turned balusters spaced two per tread. Its square newel post is fluted 3/4 of the way up and is topped by carved panels with a leaf design (see negative #28). Doors and windows are surrounded by the same astragal-ogee moldings as used on the exterior, but with bull's eye cornerblocks and no pedimented lintels. The interior doors are all raised, four panel with a painted grained finish.

There are no outbuildings on the site.


