DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Floyd MacIntyre Farm is situated on a mountain named The Elbow, which rises southeast from the Savage River. The two-story vertical-plank farmhouse and its complement of barns and outbuildings are spread over land sloping downhill to the northwest. The house is situated at the lowest point of the land.

The two bay by one bay farmhouse faces south. A one-bay-square kitchen ell adjoins the east end of the rear. Enclosed porches cover the ell's east side, and all but the east end of the main block. 2/2 sash windows light all but the east end of the main block, where a pair of joined 6/6 sash windows appear on the first floor.

Insul-brick covers the house. Corrugated metal covers the roof. The building stands on a stone foundation. A central brick stove-flue chimney heats the main block, while an exterior brick stove-flue chimney heats the north end of the ell. The porches are sheathed in a variety of vertical and horizontal boards, and lit mainly by six-pane windows. A cellar entrance is located under the porch at the southwest end of the house.

The main block is divided into two rooms, east and west, and the ell contains the kitchen. The entrance, is located at the east end of the facade. The boxed stair runs along the central partition in the main, or east, room. A batten door at the partition's south end leads into the other room. A four-panel door opens into a closet under the stair. The house has board ceilings and partitions. A coal stove heats the main room.

A double-pen log barn is the largest of the farm buildings (See site plan). The roofless structure is built of unhewn logs joined with roughly finished saddle-and-V-notching at the corners. The logs extend in irregular lengths beyond the corner.

The nearby single-pen log barn is of similar construction. The roof is covered with c. 3' long hand-riven side lapped wooden shingles. Vertical boards cover the gable ends. The building has a wide door opening on the north end, with a small square loft opening above.

The farm's third log building is a chicken house. The structure stands five logs, or about 4' high at the eaves. Its construction resembles that of the barns. Vertical boards sheath the gable ends, and corrugated metal covers the roof. The entrance appears in the south end. The building stands on a stone foundation.

The shed-roofed corn crib stands on wooden blocks. It is sheathed in horizontal boards, as is the nearby gable-roofed shed. Riven shingles cover the shed's roof. This building stands on stone piers. Either building is entered from the east side.

The 1924 shed has a ladder leading to a loft door in the east gable end. A door opens into the main level on the north side, and several openings light the south side. Battens cover the vertical planks. Corrugated metal covers the roof.

The gable-roofed vertical-plank springhouse rests on a stone foundation. The west gable end is cantilevered over the cellar opening. The spring emerges to the east, above the building. It runs into a pool in a small structure with a stone foundation, a

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is a well-preserved farmstead displaying a variety of buildings still in use much as they were in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The grandfather of present owner Floyd MacIntyre, Peter MacIntyre, first settled the farm, probably before 1870. Peter's father John emigrated from Ireland and settled in the Barton area. Floyd's father John William MacIntyre was born in 1871.

John W. helped his father build the double pen log barn in 1889. The roof of this barn was destroyed in the disastrous December 1, 1974 snowstorm.

Floyd was born in 1911. In 1912 the present farmhouse was built, with neighbors John and Lawrence Wiland assisting. Lawrence drew the plans for the house. Floyd's grandmother lived in the new house, and he and his parents lived in the present workshop. There Floyd's mother died in 1915.

Floyd's father cut lumber and ran his own sawmill, in addition to running the farm. Floyd has worked in the mines and on the roads. He also shod horses until 1970. Floyd used horses on the farm until 1960, when he bought his first truck.

The hog house was built in 1924. The single pen log barn was reroofed in 1938 by Floyd and his father.

batten door, and a metal-covered gable roof. The spring sinks underground and re-emerges in the springhouse cellar. An outdoor work area appears between the spring covering and the main springhouse.

An entrance leads into the upper level of the springhouse at the east gable end. A nine-pane window lights the west end. Corrugated metal covers the roof.

The coal shed rests on short upended logs. It is constructed of vertical planks. Corrugated metal covers the gable roof.

The board and batten outhouse has a shed roof and a southern door.

The one-story woodworking shop, which was once a house, is L-shaped. Shed-roofed additions fill the northeast "L" and cover the south side. The main roof runs north-south, with the ell projecting east from the south end of the west side.

Two windows light the west side, and another lights the east end. The entrance appears at the north end. Tar paper covers the workshop roof.

On the interior, a workbench runs along the west wall.


