The Charles Magruder House is located on the south side of Russell Road, approximately one mile north of Bartlett Road, in the vicinity of Barton, Garrett County, MD. The property which consists of a single-family dwelling, a frame bankbarn and a frame springhouse, is not eligible for listing on the National Register.

The Magruder House is a two-story, front-gabled frame dwelling. The house is elevated upon a rubble stone foundation and is of balloon-frame constructed, clad with weatherboard walls. The house is two bays wide, but extends a long five bays deep with doors located on the front and side elevations (a door on the second story of the side indicates that this elevation was once adorned with a double-story porch). The house was built in the last quarter of the 19th century, and though it provides a good example of a relatively common dwelling form for the era and period, it lacks the architectural integrity to qualify for listing under Criterion . The dwelling is currently abandoned and much of the original fabric, including the windows, are missing.

The property is not known to have had associations with persons or events significant to our past and is thus not eligible under A or B.

The Charles Magruder House is a two story, gable-roofed, balloon frame building on a foundation of coursed, roughly squared stone. It rests on hewn sills and log joists. Weatherboard is nailed directly over the studs on the exterior, while lath and plaster sheathe the interior walls. The basic form of the building is a five bay by two bay, center hall plan with a symmetrical arrangement of 6/6 sash windows. Both stories have center doorways, indications of the two-tiered porch that once extended around the building.

A frame bank barn and a frame springhouse are included on the site.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Charles Magruder House is located on the south side of Russell Road approximately 1.1 miles north of Bartlett Road. The house, a springhouse, and a barn are situated on a dirt lane .4 mile from the road in the vicinity of Pickell Hill.

The house is a frame, two story, gable-roofed building on a stone foundation. It measures 5 bays by 2 bays and is oriented with its ridgeline running E-W. The 5 bay north and south elevations have symmetrically placed six over six sash windows with raised, four panel doors in their center bays on both the first and second floors. (Local residents claim that the house once had a two level porch extending all around the house. This justifies the second floor exterior doors, however, no scars indicating the locations of the porch mar the building.) Since both north and south elevations are identical, it is uncertain which served as the main facade. The endwalls are also symmetrically arranged; the east end, in addition, having a center door and a shed porch.

The building rests on a coursed, roughly squared stone foundation topped by hewn sills that are half-lapped at the corners. The floor joists are log, hewn on two sides, and the walls are balloon frame. The interior of the frame is covered with lath and plaster. Weatherboard is nailed directly over the studs on the exterior except for the west endwall which has had some alteration. It is covered with diagonal board and the window openings are cut through the exterior layer only, not the interior lath and plaster. Window and door surrounds consist of plain, flat board with narrow sills and simple drip moldings. The roof is covered with tarpaper and has a narrow box cornice with partial gable end returns. A brick stove chimney is located on the eastern end of the ridgeline.

The interior plan is arranged around a center hall with one large room on the east side and two rooms on the west side.

A balloon frame springhouse on a coursed, roughly squared stone foundation lies northeast of the house. Its gable roof, which is covered with tarpaper, projects over the southeast entrance. The interior has a concrete floor and a concrete trough on the northeast wall. Vertical board siding covers the exterior.

A frame, gable-roofed bank barn lies northwest of the house. It rests on a stepped foundation of coursed, roughly squared stone and is sided with vertical board. A shed wing extends across the rear (southwest elevation).


