Friendsville

The ruins of this iron furnace are located on the east side of Accident Friendsville Road, just north of Paul Fike Road, just within the southeastern corner of the town boundaries of Friendsville, near Bear Creek.

This furnace was a small charcoal- or coal-fueled blast furnace erected in 1828 by a Baltimore and Allegany County syndicate to produce pig iron. High transportation costs forced the furnace to close in 1839. This was the first organized industry and incorporated company to operate in what is now Garrett County. This activity marked the beginning of Friendsville as a village. Only traces of the furnace remain.
