Public/private

Milestone No. ---(219), a short distance due north of Gum Hill, was a "small mound of stones, with a cherry tree growing in it," ^{in 1902} and believed by the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary to have marked Mason and Dixon's 194th mile west of the northeast corner of Maryland, the beginning of their 230.228-mile English provincial boundary, later known as the Mason-Dixon Line. No trace of this mound was found during the 1981 field inspection, although a huge cherry stump matched a paced distance from the next monument west, No. ---(220). Never monumented, this site and its possible significance cannot be evaluated until resurveyed and reliably reestablished by a civil engineer.

Milestone No. ---(219) ^{is} described by the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary (MGS Vol. 7, 1908, p. 100) as a "Small mound of stones, with a cherry tree growing in it, in fence line one mile west of No. 217, and believed to mark Mason and Dixon's 197th mile post" (194th ^{mile} from the northeast corner of Maryland) ^{and} appears to have been decimated over time, although noted in Bayliff (1959, p. 116) as having been located during the 1950 field inspection of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary markers. Until ^{the site is} resurveyed by a civil engineer, and point reestablished, it cannot be determined, on beyond the most likely prospect photographed and paced from No. ---(220) a short distance west.

The area ^{sparsely settled} here is ^{and farmed} rolling, cleared/land, just north of Gum Hill, with woods along the slopes. The site is within Election District 2 of Garrett County, MD, and Henry Clay Township of Fayette County, PA; about .1 mile southeast of the village of Markleysburg; about 1½ miles north-northeast of the scattered settlement of Asher Glade, MD; at a point about 1400 feet east of MD 42/LR 26067; about 850 feet east of No. ---(220); now in an east-west barbed wire fence line separating ^{cleared} Umbel/fields (on south side) from Meyers partially wooded slope (on north side), though shown on the 1900-03 engineer's map (Plate LXXII) as south of this fence ^{property} and/boundary line. The site cannot be seen from any road, and was not reliably located at the time of the 9/81 field inspection, although the entire line between Nos. ---(218) and ---(220) was walked.

As with most stoney farmed fields, stones are ^{tossed or} piled along fence lines. None fit the descriptions above or paced distance from No. ---(220).

Until this mound site is found or reestablished through a civil engineer's resurvey of this part of the Mason-Dixon Line, the significance of this unmarked site is negligible. It was believed by the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary to have marked the 194th mile west of the northeast corner of Maryland, the beginning of Mason and Dixon's 230.228-mile/provincial boundary later known as the Mason-Dixon Line, famous for its historical impact and innovative survey methods. Never monumented, it is presently believed decimated since the 1950 field inspection of the Maryland-Pennsylvania portion of this Line.





