## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Frank W. Georg Farm is located west off George Road, about a mile north of Accident. The farm is located on a ridge above a stream that feeds Bear Creek. The farm includes a house, barn, and several outbuildings.

The house is a two-story, gable-roofed dwelling which is set into a hill so that a full basement story is created on the west and south elevations. The facade was probably originally on the south elevation, but has been obscured by a one-story, shed-roofed addition. The house measures three bays on the north and south elevations and two bays on the east and west gable ends.

The house rests on a cut stone foundation and is covered with brick-patterned asphalt roll siding. The windows are two over two sash with simple window heads and plainboard surrounds. The entrance door, on the east elevation of the one-story addition, also has a simple window heads and a plain surround.

The roof of the main block is covered with asphalt shingles, while the roof of the addition is covered with corrugated metal. The house has two stove chimneys: an interior brick chimney at the center of the main block, and an exterior cinderblock chimney near the west end of the one-story addition. Another exterior stove chimney on the east elevation of the main block has been blocked at the top of the first-floor level. The interior is unknown.

Southwest of the house is a log springhouse, set on a cut stone foundation. The springhouse has two levels, and the V-notched logs are chinked with rocks and pieces of wood and daubed with cement. The joists for the second story are notched into the log sill and these notches are cut through to the outside of the sill. The roof is covered with wood shingles. The springhouse faces east and the spring lies in front of it. West of the springhouse the water re-emerges and is caught in a trough.

Southwest of the springhouse is a shed-roofed single-saddle-notched log outbuilding. The outbuilding is chinked with wood and daubed with mud. Above the log walls the walls have been extended with vertical boards.

South of the house is a frame bank barn with a modern silo. Several other outbuildings and part of a stone foundation complete the property.


