**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

This brick house is located in a hilly, semi-wooded area off Rt. 495, approximately 1/4 mile north of Dunhill Road. The house faces west. It is a two-story, three bay by two bay structure with a gable roof. A single story shed addition is located at the rear, east, elevation with a porch supported by turned posts with jigsaw trim at the south end. A porch, supported by metal posts and balustrades extends across the facade. The front central entrance has a transom and a wooden door with a top glass panel. The house can also be entered from the south elevation of the rear addition at the porch.

The house has an interior brick chimney at each gable end. Two over two sash windows light the house. The windows have carved wooden window heads with arched brick headers above. Two, single pane windows are located at each gable end. The cellar is entered from the rear elevation. The roof of this brick house is covered with alternating diamond-shaped and rectangular asphalt shingles.

South of the farmhouse, a frame bank barn stands on a stone and concrete block foundation.
