The house was one of the first in Garrett County to be built on a poured concrete foundation. The house was built circa 1912 by Archibald Riley Bernard who was a local farmer, carpenter, blacksmith, and miller.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This frame farmhouse is situated in a hilly area on John Beachy Road approximately 1½ miles west of Rt. 495. The house faces east. It is a two story, three-bay by one-bay, gable roof structure with the gable end front. A one-bay by one-bay ell extends from the south elevation. A single story shed addition extends the length of the north elevation of the main block.

A wooden porch, supported by chamfered posts, runs across the facade (including the end of the shed addition) and the south elevation of the main block to the ell.

The house can be entered from the facade door with sidelights, from an entrance on the facade of the ell, and from the north elevation of the shed addition.

A central brick chimney is located on the main block. 1/1 sash windows light the house. Two large windows with transoms appear on the house, one to the south side of the entrance on the facade and the other on the south elevation. 2/2 sash windows, the top pane surrounded with sixteen small panes, are located in the gable ends. Jigsawn trim appears also in the (south) gable end of the ell. The cellar is entered at ground level, due to an embankment, from the south elevation.

The house rests on a concrete block (half of which is rock-faced) foundation. Asbestos shingles cover the house with diamond-shaped asbestos shingles on the roof.

A barn and a hog pen are located to the south of the house, a machine shed and coal/smoke house of ceramic tile to the north.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is an example of a common Western Maryland type. Houses of this general configuration, a rectangular main block and rear kitchen wing, were constructed in Garrett County from the late 19th through the early 20th centuries.

The house was one of the first in Garrett County to be built on a poured concrete foundation. The house was built ca. 1912 by Archibald Riley Bernard who was a local farmer, carpenter, blacksmith, and miller.
