The Cornish Manor Restaurant is a good example of the fine summer resort homes constructed in Garrett County in the mid to late 19th century.

The Cornish Manor was built in 1868 by John M. Jarboe, an Oakland builder/contractor, as a summer residence for Judge Wilton J. Lambert of Washington, C.C. Under Judge Lambert's ownership it was known as "Thorncroft."

During the late 19th century Lawson Loar of Clarksburg, WV, acquired "Thorncroft" and renamed it "Ethelhurst" in honor of his daughter, Ethel. Loar only owned the house for 5 years and was forced to sell the property due to illness in his family.

"Ethelhurst" was offered for sale at half its value. Some of the features mentioned in the sale brochure included: 19-3/4 acres (of which 7 remain with the house), 3 orchards of 171 fruit trees, a 3-acre Virgin Forest, the 14-room homestead with a hot water heating system, the 125-foot veranda with sun parlor, electricity, pure water, natural gas, Bell Telephone, 200 oak trees and more.

During Lawson Loar's short ownership, he made improvements and alterations to the house which reflect its more late-19th-century appearance.

In more recent times the house was apparently owned by a Lewis Cornish who operated a speakeasy known as the "Redman Club," complete with gambling. After the place was closed down, it was used as a nursing home, and then opened as a restaurant in 1963. Mr. Bobo acquired Cornish Manor in 1968.

Research has not identified any associations with the lives of persons significant to the Oakland area's past or with events that have contributed significantly to broad patterns of the area's historical development. This resource has not yet yielded and is not likely to yield significant information important in history or prehistory. However, the architecture does provide an excellent example of the fine summer resort homes constructed in Garrett County in the late 19th century, and thus meets National Register Criterion C. Cornish Manor possesses integrity of association, location, setting, workmanship, feeling, design, and material, and we recommend it eligible for the National Register under Criterion C. The recommended National Register boundaries include the entire tax parcel.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cornish Manor Restaurant, situated on 7 acres of land on the north side of the old road to Deer Park and less than a mile east of Oakland, was built as a summer residence in 1868. It is a frame, 2-story, 5 bay by 2 bay dwelling based on the "T plan" with a gable roof. The houses faces southeast and has a central entrance. A large, gable-roofed dormer with a 24 pane window projects from the facade roof, breaking the eave line.

The front of the house has a high foundation; the rear, N. W. elevation is set into a slope. A raised, 1-story, shed, roofed, ornately decorated, porch runs across the facade and wraps around the NE elevation of the main block and the entire SW elevation, filling in the "T" addition. At the southwest end of the facade and along the SW elevation the porch is enclosed, creating a large sun parlor. The porch covers 2 bay windows on the NE elevation. It rests on a concrete base, replacing an earlier wooden lattice base. The entrance is approached by a modern wooden staircase, replacing an earlier more ornate one. The facade entrance consists of a paneled door flanked by wood panels surmounted by sidelights. A wide 3-pane transom surmounts the sidelights and door.

A small shed addition is located in the northeast corner of the main block and "T". A modern metal shed garage extends from the rear, NW elevation of the "T".

The house is covered with weatherboard siding. The upper gable ends are covered with sawtoothed shingles and have full cornice returns. The facade dormer is covered with ornately edged shingles and has a partial cornice return.

Windows are 2/2 sash with drip molded window heads and have shutters. There is a double window at the second story above the facade entrance.

Porch details include: a gabled pediment on the roof over the facade entrance, chamfered posts with open-worked, jig-sawn brackets and spools, and a plain, squared, balustrade.

The interior is based on a four-room plan with a central hallway. There are 3 outstanding features within the house: 1) the ceiling is coffered and of dark narrow beaded boards, 2) the large back room on the 1st story within the main block is approached from the central hallway through a wide ogee arch, which in turns opens into a smaller room in the northeast corner of the main block through another ogee arch and 3) the large backroom contains the prominent open, winding staircase which leads to the second story, (presently used as living quarters).

There is one fireplace on the northeast wall of the front room.

A cave, built in the ground and faced with concrete, lies 20 feet northwest of the house.


