Justification for decision: (Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map)
The John E. and Diana B. Weber House, an impressive oversized bungalow built circa 1915, is associated with the founder of a significant local industry but also relates to the continued expansion and settlement of the Oakland and Mountain Lake Park areas in the early and mid-twentieth century. The development of summer vacation resorts and hotels in the Oakland area in the late nineteenth century had helped to fuel settlement of the region. Although no longer as prominent a resort in the early and mid-twentieth century, Oakland still remained an important local mercantile and community center, and continued its growth throughout this period.


The Weber house is also associated with the H. Weber & Sons Company (MHT # G-IV-A-262), which was an extensive greenhouse and florist operation situated between Oakland and Mountain Lake Park south of MD 135. German immigrant Henry Weber was a nationally-recognized horticulturalist whose varieties of chrysanthemums and carnations won numerous awards at flower shows throughout the United States, and whose greenhouses produced vegetables and potted plants in addition to a large selection of cut flowers. During the company's heyday, Henry Weber had a spacious and ornate Queen Anne-style house called Seelheim (MHT # G-IV-A-172) erected atop a hill overlooking the greenhouses between 1898 and 1904. In the 1910s, Weber's son Ralph built this equally impressive bungalow complete with outdoor tennis court.

This house is associated with Ralph Weber, who, as a partner in the H. Weber & Sons Company, had a significant impact on the Oakland area's past and was also associated with the development of a major local industry. The house is also an excellent, unusually large, and well-preserved example of an early twentieth-century frame bungalow, and it retains integrity of location, setting, workmanship, feeling, material, association, and design. This resource is not likely to yield significant information important in history or prehistory. Therefore the Weber House is recommended eligible for the National Register under Criterion B, association with a person important in local history, and Criterion C, embodiment of the distinctive characteristics of an architectural style. The recommended National Register boundaries include the entire tax parcel.





This is a large, one-and-one-half-story, five-by-four-bay, gable-roofed frame bungalow with a full-width front porch, a shed-roofed front dormer, an interior brick chimney, an enclosed shed-roofed side porch, and a large T-shaped rear wing attached to the main block via a covered walkway. The house includes a concrete foundation, asphalt-shingled walls, and a steeply-pitched asphalt-shingled gable roof finished with decorative verges, eave brackets, and trusswork. Windows are mostly bungalow-style nine-over one, double-hung wooden sash with wooden trim. The primary entrances contain wood and glass bungalow doors with wooden surrounds. One end of the T-shaped wing terminates in a ruinous frame chicken house and stable and a concrete block building which houses the dwelling's boiler. The opposite end of the "T" terminates in a gable-roofed frame garage that matches the house. Southwest of the house stands a large outdoor tennis court furnished with a covered viewing bench. The house faces east-southeast and occupies an open, sloping, and tree-surrounded site on the west side of Route 219 about one mile south-southeast of Oakland.

This is a large, one-and-one-half-story, five-by-four-bay, gable-roofed frame bungalow with a full-width front porch, a shed-roofed front dormer, an enclosed shed-roofed side porch, and a large T-shaped rear wing attached to the main block via a covered walkway. The house faces east-southeast and occupies an open, sloping, and tree-surrounded site on the west side of Route 219 about one mile south-southeast of Oakland.

The house is built on a concrete foundation that encloses a full cellar. The walls are clad in pale green asphalt shingles with plain wooden corner boards and topped with a steeply-pitched asphalt-shingled gable roof. The roof is finished with exposed rafter feet, deep overhanging eaves, a flat wooden raking board, a wooden eave with decorative triangular eave brackets, open wooden trusswork at the peaks, and a verge embellished with triangular wooden dentils. A single interior corbelled brick chimney pierces the rear slope of the roof near the center of the house. Rectangular attic windows pierce the gable peaks.

Windows consist mostly of single bungalow-style nine-over one double-hung wooden sash finished with flat wooden surrounds, sills, and drip caps. Variations include a few small horizontal bungalow-style windows which pierce the front elevation, a set of paired bungalow windows in the front dormer, and several bungalow-style casement windows on the northeast gable. Several one-light fixed sash windows light the cellar level. The front entrance is centered on the southeast elevation and contains a wood and glass bungalow door. A side entrance leads into the enclosed side porch and is fitted with a similar door. The cellar entrance pierces the northeast gable; it is fitted with a four-light half-glass paneled wooden door. Like the window openings, the door openings are finished with flat wooden surrounds, sills, and drip caps.

The open-sided, full-width front porch is tucked beneath the overhanging front slope of the house roof. The porch consists of a wooden deck, an enclosed asphalt-shingled balustrade capped by a wooden rail, eight square and slightly battered wooden columns with square stepped wooden capitals, and a beaded wooden ceiling. A short flight of steps leads to the porch deck. The back porch consists of two open-sided shed-roofed cutaway porches under either end of the rear shed-roofed addition. The fully-enclosed side porch is clad in asphalt shingles to match the rest of the house, lit by several closely-spaced bungalow-style windows, and topped with an asphalt-shingled shed roof.

A long, T-shaped, stucco-covered one-story building joins the rear elevation of the house via a covered walkway. The central part of the "T" is clad in green asphalt shingles, lit by two-over-two double-hung wooden sash windows with wooden surrounds, and topped with an asphalt-shingled gable roof. The northeast end of the "T" terminates in a rectangular one-story concrete block building which houses the steam boiler unit for the main dwelling. To the east of the boiler unit extends an attached, semi-ruinous, one-story, shed-roofed frame chicken house and the ruin of a stable. The southwest end of the "T" terminates in a one-story, gable-roofed, gable-fronted frame garage. This building is clad in stucco and green asphalt shingles to match the house and the rest of the rear wing. It is also topped with an asphalt-shingled gable roof with matching triangular dentils on the verge. A large wooden garage door pierces the southeast gable, and two nine-light wood and glass windows pierce the southwest wall. This large addition creates an open and protected courtyard at the rear of the house.

Just southwest of the house stands a large outdoor tennis court. A gable-roofed pole-supported covered swing intended as a viewing bench for the tennis court stands at the eastern side of the court.

A driveway leads past the southwest gable of the house and terminates at the garage door. The house stands on an open site that is surrounded by trees. It is presently occupied, retains very good integrity, and remains in good condition.



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





Resource Sketch Map
