The Jeremiah Miller Farmhouse is a frame, two story, gable-roofed building on a coursed, roughly squared stone foundation. It's basic configuration is a three bay by two bay rectangular plan with a two-story, one bay by one bay gable-roofed wing projecting from the southernmost bay of the facade. Shed-roofed porches with jigsaw brackets span both the facade and rear elevations. A two-story, gable-roofed bay window protrudes from the northeast endwall.

Northeast of the house is a gable-roofed bank barn with a hewn frame that is mortise and tenoned together.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Jeremiah Miller Farm is located on the east side of US Route 219 south approximately .7 mile south of its intersection with US Route 50. The farm, which includes an early twentieth century house and barn, and several recent outbuildings, is set on a hill that slopes down from the road.

The house is a frame, two-story, gable-roofed building on a coursed, roughly squared stone foundation. Its basic configuration is a three bay by two bay rectangular plan with a two-story, one bay by one bay gable-roofed wing projecting from the southernmost bay of the facade. Shed-roofed porches with jigsaw brackets span both the facade and rear elevations. A two story, gable-roofed bay window protrudes from the northeast endwall.

All windows are 1/1 sash. The facade door, which occupies the center bay, is topped by a single pane transom light. Green asphalt shingles obscure the original siding and also caused the removal of the window surrounds. The asphalt-shingled roof has two interior brick stove chimnies located on its ridgeline.

Approximately 10 feet in front of the facade wing a spring emerges from the hill and flows under the house.

Northeast of the house is a gable-roofed bank barn with a hewn frame that is mortise and tenoned together. Its roof is constructed with pole rafters and its original foundation has been replaced with cinder block. A concrete block milkhouse and a concrete silo are associated with the barn.

Several frame outbuildings, ca. 1930-40, are also located on the property: a machine shed, a chicken house, a brooder house, a corn crib.
