The James D. Harvey Barn, the only barn of its kind in Garrett County, is a sixteen-sided, frame bank barn on a poured concrete foundation. Its basic configuration is a regular polygon with a diameter of thirty-five feet, each of the individual sides measuring eight feet wide. The building is forty-five feet tall, capped by a gable roof. Access to the ground level, which is furnished with several animal stalls, is through a set of double doors on the northeast elevation. A gable-roofed bank entrance projecting from the west elevation leads to the upper level hay lofts.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The James D. Harvey Barn is a sixteen-sided, frame bank barn on a poured concrete foundation. Its basic configuration is a regular polygon with a diameter of thirty-five feet, each of the individual sides measuring eight feet wide. The building is forty-five feet tall, capped by a gable roof. Access to the ground level, which is furnished with several animal stalls, is through a set of double doors on the northeast elevation. A gable-roofed bank entrance projecting from the west elevation leads to the upper level hay lofts.

The pair of batten doors to the lower level occupy one entire eight foot wall. Entering the building, the left-hand door is wide enough for animal passage and is without a sill. The right-hand door is narrower, and although its head is even with the left-hand door is narrower, and although its head is even with the left-hand door, its sill falls roughly one foot short of the ground. The interior of the ground level has a dirt floor and an array of stalls that were meant to accomodate five cows, four horses, and several sheep.¹ Light is provided by the six-pane windows that pierce each of the walls, excepting those walls that are occupied by the two entrances. A flight of stairs in the center of this room leads to the upper level.

The bank entrance that provides exterior access to the upper level is a frame, gable-roofed projection that occupies two of the eight foot walls. This projection is covered with vertical board and has two horizontally sliding doors. A small, square window lights each of the two sides and the triangular space above the doors.

The interior of the upper level was built as, and is still used as a hay loft. Except for the entrance and the center area, the whole floor space is reserved for the storage of hay bales. Above the floor are three additional partial lofts that resemble shelves. Extending only part way into the center of the room, the shelves occupy opposing walls and are each situated at a different height from the floor.

The gable roof of the barn is covered with corrugated metal and has exposed rafter ends. A square ventilator located at the midpoint of the north-south running ridgeline has been removed.

The frame of the building is made of circular sawn chestnut and hewn chestnut joists. Unpainted weatherboard with plain cornerboards at each angle sheathe the exterior. The weatherboard is in bad need of repair. At this date, several panels of corrugated metal cover some weak spots on the walls.

A frame, two story, gable-roofed dwelling, dating from the same period as the barn, is located northeast of the barn.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The James D. Harvey Barn is significant as the only many-sided barn in Garrett County. Only two other many-sided buildings are known to exist in the county: the 1874, octagonal Mill Run Mercy Chapel (site # G-II-B-050), and a 1911, octagonal brooder house located on the Edward Barnard Homestead (site # G-IV-C-043).

J.D. Harvey built the foundation and frame of the barn with help from his family. The building was then completed by a barn raising in 1907. Trees on the property were harvested and cut on a steam tractor to supply the wood to build it.²

Mr. Harvey's reason for building the barn in a round form was that he thought round barns did not require long or strong timbers.³


