DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This dwelling has been moderately remodelled. It is a two-story frame house, now covered with aluminum siding. Overall, the home is L-shaped, facing Old York Road to the north, and has a one-story, one-bay-by-one addition on the eastern side. The house, looking at the north side from the road is three bays by two (four bays across on the northern face's second story). The posterior leg of the "L" is two bays by one. The entire building sits upon a low stone foundation. Windows are 6 X 6, with the exception of the attic glasses, which are 2 X 2. The principal portal is located on the northern wall, dignifying an otherwise utilitarian house with a seven-light transom and four-pane sidelights. A second door is on the southwestern side of the wing and a third is positioned on the southern side of the main structure. The cellar way is also along this same wall. A three-bay, shed-roof porch shrouds the main portal, with tapered square columns. An enclosed shelter spans the southwest side of the wing. The roof is gable-front and slate, with flared-end cornices, boxed eaves and friezes, all original. The corbeled brick chimney is indigenous to the older part of the structure. It is on the southern inside-end of the rear part of the wing. The other is a new outside-end, resting on the new addition.

The older farm buildings are located closest to the house. Directly behind it is a small gable-roofed gazebo that was originally a milking shed. West of the house are the main barn and the hog barn, both of vertical planking and with stone bases. The original board-and-batten doors have been retained and both buildings have wood-shingle roofs and pegged interior joists (See diagram). South of the house are the remaining older structures; the chicken coop, the meathouse and the large blacksmith shop. The meathouse is a small, two by one bay affair, with board-and-batten siding and a gable-flank roof. The blacksmith shop still has the original forge although the exterior has been altered. It is two stories, with clapboard siding and a gable-flank tin roof. The few windows are 6 X 6.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This farm is partially located on a part of My Lady's Manor, a gift from the aged Charles Calvert in 1713 to his fourth wife. This particular tract, known as California, was taken up by a commission assigned to dispose of confiscated British property, and was sold in 1785 to Thomas Galloway. The oldest parts of the buildings date from the late Nineteenth Century and were probably built by the Patterson family. The presence of a three-generation blacksmith shop makes this farm somewhat unique, although the structures are not that old nor that architecturally earthshattering.

WELCOME

My Lady's Manor Farm situated on the outskirts of Lord Baltimore's Gift is owned and operated by Jeanette and Ross E. Smith, Jr. The Farm consists of 190 acres and 500 acres are rented for crops.

This is a dairy farm with crops of corn, grain, alfalfa and clover hay. There are 105 milk cows and 100 heifers. All stock is registered with the National Holstein-Friesian Association.

The milking herd produces about 2 tons of milk per day. This amounts to about 480 gallons or 1920 quarts per day. Dairy farmers sell their milk to bottling or processing plants for about \$9.50 per hundred pounds. This amounts to 80¢ per gallon or 20¢ per quart.

The value of cows milking averages \$800, while the heifers are valued at \$500. Land values average \$1000 per acre. Equipment is valued at \$50,000. Recent building improvements were valued at \$35,000.

Our two oldest sons are involved in the family operation full-time. The third son hopes for a career in Veterinary Medicine. Our daughter will be a senior this year and is anticipating a career in law.

In April 1976 at the Maryland State Black and White Show our son had Reserve Grand Champion 4-H Animal.

Also this past year we at My Lady's Manor Farm have again joined the International Export Market. We have a cow in Italy, Canada and one will be leaving for Japan soon.


