DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This northern-facing dwelling is divided into three sections. The first is stone, covered with wood shingles, two and one-half stories and four bays by two. The windows on the eastern aspect are very close together. A rear one-story wing is attached to the southern wall of the previous unit. It is of white-painted stone, with a high exposed cellar, and is one bay by two. The third unit is attached to the western end of the shingled section, being two stories tall and measuring three bays by two. All of the regular level sashes are 6 X 6, in pegged frames, with the exception some latticed windows in the remodeled kitchen wing, and some 6 X 9 panes on the first floor of the stone wing. Two 2 X 2 attic lights are on the western end of the stone wing, and single 6 X 6 garrett lights are located on the eastern and western extremes of the shingled unit. The principal doorways are located along the northern facade, the shingled wing having three-pane side-lights and the stone unit possessing a three-light transom. Doorways lead to the porch attached to the southern side of the stone wing; one from the wing and the other from the abutting shingled section. An entrance is sited on the eastern wall of the kitchen section, facing the porch. A board-and-batten cellar door is located on the southern side at the base of the kitchen wall. The roofs of the larger two sections are gable-f~~h~~ank and slate, with wide eaves and angled-in box cornices. On either side of the shingled section's roof are two gabled, 6 X 6, corniced dormers. Along the northern face of the shingled unit is a three-bay hipped-roof porch with rounded columns. The southern side of the stone section has a three-bay, shed-roofed enclosure, built upon stone pillars. A recently-constructed stone porch skirts the length of the eastern kitchen facade. Two tandem inside-end brick chimneys are sited on the eastern inside-end of the shingled section, one on either side of the ridge line. A brick flue is located on the western inside-end of the stone portion, and a tapered brick stack dots the southern inside-end of the kitchen wing. A number of illegible carvings are inscribed in a single soapstone block in the foundation of the southwest corner of the shingled section.

The oldest outbuildings are the stone springhouse, located behind the main dwelling, and the carriage house and barn, located across the road from the house. All are composed of native stone, with vertical wooden upper works and slate gabled roofs.

The Interior

The shingled section has elaborate interior details. Most of first floor walls are fully or partially panelled, and most of the windows have paneling underneath. Also to be found is the the original flooring, chair rails and dentiled cornices. There were once two fireplaces, but now there is but one, with a soapstone hearth. The central hall may have been a thru hall at one time and contains a stairway that parallels the hall and abruptly curves into a semicircular landing above. It's bannister is cherry, and the risers are quite shallow. Small brackets appear in the panelling beneath the treads. The stairway in the stone section is more rude, with evidence of pegging. It also has narrow rails. The main room in this portion has a fireplace along the western wall and chair rails. Most of the doors though the home have block and beam trim. The upstairs and the attic are completely

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The main house could have been built within the first third or half of the Nineteenth Century. However, the lion's share of significance here goes to the outbuilding, in particular, the tenant house. This later structure had a myriad of functions, with a tannery on the lower level, spinning looms on the upper level and a smokehouse on the western end. A stone "sweatbox" was located near the southeast corner of the dwelling. The tract on which this complex is located upon is called Southampton, and had several owners, according to the 1783 Tax List. Christopher Clements held 75 acres, James Moore, a tanner whose name would be associated with this property for 100 years, owned 225 acres, a gristmill and 120 acres of other tracts. Simon Denny, whose land was eventually sold to John Moores by Simon's son in 1796 owned 130 acres of Southampton. John Moores held almost 600 acres at one time, and the 1798 Tax List shows him as living in an unusual frame, one-story home. A 28 X 26 dwelling with a piazza was connected via a passageway to a frame kitchen, and there were also six assorted wooden ancillary structures. John Moores was also active in civic affairs, serving on the petit jury in 1791 and as a judge in 1800. He was also a trustee for the Bel Air Academy in 1812. The property remained in the Moores family until 1890 and apparently, so did the tanning trade, as it was still listed on the 1878 Martenet Map.

finished, and there are fireplaces sited over the ones on the first floor. The kitchen section has been completely remodeled, but a huge stone hearth is sited on the southern wall. The cellar contains log and hand-cut crossbeams, as well as a cooking fireplace.

Description of the Tenant House

This is an oblong, two-storied structure facing towards the north. The walls are of uncoursed stone, quoined at the corners. A small, one-storied, stone addition is attached to the eastern extreme, and is half the width of the eastern wall. This small gabled addition is one bay by one, while the rest of the building measures four bays by two. There are only three apertures on the first level of the northern side, while two 2 X 2 attic openings are found in the eastern gable extremes. Most of these windows are 6 X 6's (with a few 1 X 1's on the southern exposure), seated in pegged frames. The main doorway is located on the northern side, an entrance to the attached smokehouse room is sited along the western extreme, a portal leads into the small addition from it's southern side, and a cellar entrance is located on the southern wall of the main building. Southern entryways also lead to the first and second levels, with one door above the other. The roof is a wide-eaved slate gable-flank with three brick chimneys along the ridgeline. Two are inside-ends on the eastern and western extremes, while the third is positioned on the interior, near the western end. Two ad hoc porches have been built; a small shelter over the northern entrance, and a pillared structure before the southern first floor structure. The western end of this home was once a two-level smokehouse, and the blackened walls and meatracks are still intact.
