The Weber House is a two and a half story three bay wide frame dwelling covered by a steeply pitched gable flank roof with dormers on the front. Built in the last quarter of the 19th century, the house has many features typical of that era such as a two story bay addition with a bracketed gable roof, imbricated shingles and plain bargeboards. A cast iron urn on a pedestal painted green and white remains in the side yard; it is a type of outdoor planter which was popular in the Victorian era.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

126 N. Union Avenue is a two and a half story three bay by three bay L-shape dwelling on a slightly above grade lighted granite foundation. The house is located on the corner of N. Union and Pennington Avenues, facing east. The dwelling is clapboard with shingled gables; it is painted white with green trim.

An above grade three bay porch extends across the front elevation. The porch has a bracketed shed roof supported by bracketed turned posts and a turned post balustrade. A brick foundation underlines the porch. On the south wall of the ell is a two bay shed porch having plain posts.

Windows are arranged evenly on the front elevation. There, as throughout the house, they have 1/1 light sash, sills and lintels having slightly raised edges. In addition, many of the windows are framed by louvered shutters. A two story bay addition with a shingled lighted gable roof supported by Eastlake brackets is on the south elevation. Panels beneath the first story windows have linear designs in them.

The main entrance, located in the north bay front elevation, has a vestibule of wood and glass in front of it. The doors themselves contain deeply molded polygonal and rectangular panels. A one light transom is above them.

The house is covered by a steeply pitched gable roof that is covered with asphalt shingles. A plain barge board with a design of raised squares on it covers the eaves of the main section. The eaves of the gable roof on the bay addition display a similar design; in addition, the two gabled dormers on the front of the roof share the same design and construction as the larger gables. The house has a medium size brick center chimney.

Outbuildings: Three board and batten outbuildings are found directly behind the house. Closer to Freedom Alley, at the west end of the lot is a particularly interesting outbuilding. It is a one story frame structure, covered with tarpaper on a high stone foundation. Now used for a garage, the building has 6/6 light sash windows. On the south elevation, the stone is patched with brick and it extends beyond the base of frame structure. Thus, making it appear that the foundation, older than the structure surmounting it, was part of another earlier and larger building.

Another curious feature of the property is the large cast iron fountain or watering trough south of the front of the house, it can be described as an urn on a pedestal decorated with gargoyles and flowers.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This two and a half story three bay wide frame dwelling was probably built sometime in the last quarter of the 19th century. It is covered by a steeply pitched gable flank roof with dormers on the front. Finishing the gable ends is a rather plain bargeboard with a repetitive pattern carved in it. A two story bay addition with a gable roof is on the south elevation, and imbicated shingles are in all the attic gables. On the south side of the front of the house is an unusual cast iron urn on a pedestal of late Victorian design, painted green and white. It appears to be the only one this type left in the City.; although cast iron swan planters are found in front of HA-547.

Union Ave. runs north to south with the Chesapeake Bay at the southern end. Wide and tree shaded, the street has many architecturally significant buildings of different styles on it; it is the the City's most impressive street visually. The northern and middle part of Union Ave. are rich in 19th and early 20th century architecture. Whereas the southern end of the avenue is mostly new houses and MD's offices, from the hospital to the Bay.




