Located on a tributary of Deer Creek and on the tract, "Halls Rich Neck", Coolbranch Farm is one of the most beautiful farms in Harford County, with broad rolling hills and virtually no modern development with view. Indeed, the farm is much as it was at the beginning of the 20th century--the 2-1/2 story, 8 bay by 5 bay brick and stone house retains the form it had evolved into in 1866 when Jeremy McIlvain owned it and 6 of the outbuildings (including the icehouse/smokehouse, granary, corn crib and a barn) date from the mid-to-late 19th century, 3, including a dairy barn, from the early 20th century. The house itself is deceptive; it includes a 5-bay early 19th century house on the West end and a stone kitchen building in the ell, although the 1866 addition on the East and improvements (like brick veneer on the stone kitchen) dominate the earlier structures, presenting an impressive and relatively cohesive front (although an incoherent rear).

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Cool Branch Farm

This 2-1/2-story, gable-roofed brick and stone house is located on the North side of Cool Branch Road and faces South.

Although the structure comprises five separate sections, an overall superficial description is useful: Set on an uncoursed cut stone foundation, the structure is ell-shaped, 8 bays long on the South facade and five bays wide on the East side with the ell, with overall dimensions of approximately 74' by 49'5". Attached to the North end of the ell is a 2-story stone smokehouse/ice house, which measures 24' by 15'. A one-story hip-roofed stone wing, measuring 20' by 12', extends from the Northwest corner of the ell; a shed-roofed clapboard addition covers the two second story southern bays of the ell's West side.

The roof has wide eaves with a boxed cornice supported on modillions; there are five dormers in the south slope of the roof, two in the east slope of the roof of the ell. The gable-roofed dormers have wide eaves and gable returns. Windows have 6/6 sash and both panelled and panelled-and-louvered shutters. There are four brick chimneys with corbelled caps located in the three ends and between the third and fourth bays from the East in the South section. Entrances are located in the third bay from the East in the South facade, the westernmost bay of the North facade and the center bay of the ell's East and West facades. A three-bay, hipped-roof porch spans the entrance and flanking bays on the South face, and a one bay, hipped-roof portico marks the entrance on the ell's East side; an enclosed porch covers the entrance in the North face of the South section.

More specifically, the five sections decompose as follows: 1) the five western bays of the South section (47'2" X 21') constructed between 1798 & 1814; 2) the three eastern bays of the South section (26'3" X 21') constructed in 1866, as per datestone in the East gable; 3) the three North bays of the ell (30' X 20'5") stone on the North and West sides, brick on the East side, and built sometime before 1866; 4) the one-story stone wing on the Northwest; 5) the icehouse/smokehouse, now connected to the house at the North end of the ell.

1) The part comprising the 5 West bays of the South section is laid in Flemish bond with beaded joints on the South side and West end. The center bay of the South face has an elliptical brick arch and the brickwork indicates that there was an entrance here originally. Windows in the two westernmost bays are slightly shorter than those in the other three bays of the South facade. There is a seam between this section and the East section in the second story. The line of an earlier porch extends across all but the westernmost bay. The North facade, laid in five or six stretcher bond, shows evidence of alteration, but it is not clear what that alteration consisted of. Between the second and third bays from the West is a slight seam in the brickwork of the first story, and the brickwork appears altered under the second story window in the second from the West bay.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Cool Branch Farm

The western five bays of the brick South section, which measure approximately 47' by 21', probably comprise the 45 X 20 brick house ascribed to William Brown, tenant, on the 1814 Tax Assessment. At that time, this farm, part of the tract of "Hall's Rich Neck" was owned by Freeborn Brown, who had purchased it from William Cox.

The 1814 Tax Assessment credits Freeborn Brown with 670 acres of "Hall's Rich Neck" and "Good Neighborhood", 19 slaves, and one farm worth \$13,400, the other - and the one now called Cool Branch Farm - with the 45 X 20 brick house, an 18 X 26 brick kitchen, a 58 X 30 barn, meat house, stable, 3 outhouses, a 26 X 20 grist mill, a sawmill and house--valued at \$2,000.

Brown died in 1825 and left all of his real and personal estate to his wife, Mary B. Brown¹, who, 3 years later, left to her son, William, "the plantation where he now lives" called "Hall's Rich Neck" with a one-acre mill and seat.

At her death, Mary B. Brown's inventory includes 3 houses in Havre de Grace, another called "The Banking House: and 3 water lots--all with ground rents.

The value of her real and personal estate is listed as \$3,284.64.

In 1843, the property "on which William Brown now resides" was sold to Jeremiah McIlvain who must have built the 1866 addition and made most of the improvements that superceded the earlier Federal house.

Various members of the McIlvainfamily owned the farm until 1908.

Architecturally, the house is fascinating as a study in the evolution of taste over the 19th century. The early 19th century section is distinctive for its Flemish bond, beaded joints, elliptical entrance arch, and symmetrical facade and plan, successor to the Georgian Sophia's Dairy (HA- 5) and predecessor to the Col. John Street House (HA-1214) and the Graybeal-Kelly house (HA-229).

The 1866 addition and improvements with the lengthening of the principal facade into unmistakable impressiveness, the over-scaled dormers and window and door ornament, the conversion of the hall and parlor of the Federal section into a ballroom, the brick veneering of the stone kitchen building to give it more elegance and to include within the design of the house--all bespeak a desire to magnify the effect and to

On the interior this section contains two rooms with a winder staircase in the Southwest corner, although it probably originally had a center hall plan with the main staircase in the hall. The rearrangement of floorboards in the second floor hall corroborates such a plan. Probably around the time of the 1866 addition, the room on the East was transformed into a ballroom with plaster ceiling ornament and a foliate ceiling medallion. Both rooms have Victorian gray marble mantels. The trim consists of the following out-sized elements, from the outside in: fillet-quirked ogee-fillet-bead. The second floor has been re-partitioned, but there are stone hearths in the bedrooms corresponding with the fireplaces on the first floor. The attic has been finished with plaster walls and does not give access to the attic over the East section.

2) The 1866 addition on the East is laid in common bond. The interior contains one room and one entrance hall on the West, with a closet at the end. The mantel in the East room is like those in the West section; cupboards flank the chimney breast. The molded trim is like that in the ell. The second floor room has only a flue for a stove, and the attic, finished with plaster, connects to that over the ell.

3) The ell, which was probably built before the 1866 addition, is laid in common bond on the east side, like the East side of the 1866 addition, and fieldstone on the North end and West side. The interior contains a stairhall on the South and, on the North, through a hall under the stairs which also gives access to the basement staircase, a room with a fireplace and winder staircase in the Northwest corner and an exterior door in the Northeast corner. The doorway in the West wall, although now leading into the one-story stone wing, appears to have been an exterior door with beaded trim and a stone sill. The wall here is double thickness, i.e. two abutting stone walls, and it is possible that one of the two structures was moved to this location. In the basement under the ell are full log joists with hewn bottoms and a hewn sill. The attic of the ell is finished with plaster walls.

4) The one-story stone wing at the Northwest corner of the ell is laid in fieldstone with a window and entrance in the North side with fluted sandstone lintels. The door has been replaced and has a replaced wooden lintel as well. The window in the West side has a rough stone lintel, and clapboard siding is in evidence in the gable of the South side. This wing contains one room with a concrete floor and no basement. Wooden coathooks line the wall.

5) The smokehouse/icehouse attached to the North end of the ell contains a smokehouse in the second story with what appear to be sawn rafters butted together and loose random width floor boards laid in dirt or sawdust. The ice house is reached by a bulkhead entrance in the East side and has two unidentified slits in the wall. There is another room in the West end of this structure of uncertain function.

The farm outbuildings are arranged in 3 main clusters. Directly north of the house is a row of 4 mid-19th century frame structures on raised stone foundations. From the east, they are (see plat): #3 - a 2-story board- and- batten wagon shed with grain storage overhead, measuring 24'3" X 28'5", with a gable front roof; on the south side are sliding doors in the 1st story and a pulley and casement doors in the gable. #4 a 2-story, centilevered, vertical board granary (20'X20'1") with a gable flank roof and an exterior staircase on the west end; the floor joists are puncheons and the rafters are tree trunks, while the structure is hewn and the interior lined with metal. A one-story concrete block addition spans the north side of the granary and the adjoining shed (#5). The latter is one-story, vertical board and board-and-batten, constructed in 2 parts - the eastern section measuring 30'3" by 12'5", the western section 14'2" by 12'5". Separated from the other structures by the drive leading north to the barn is #6, the corn crib, vertical board on stone piers with a gable flank roof with a lean-to forming a drive-in space and second crib on the north. The corn crib has a standard post-and-beam frame, which uses cut nails.

North of this complex is a later, probably early 20th century, barn complex. The dairy bank barn itself (#13) is board-and-batten on a poured concrete foundation with a circular sawn post-and-beam pegged frame. The siding has regular-sized holes spaced erratically. Northwest and northeast of the barn are other concrete block sheds (#13,#14).

West of the brick house is a 2-story board-and-batten barn (#11) on a rubblestone foundation, measuring 39'6" by 40'8", with an apparently recent 2-story addition (27'4"X 36'6") on the south. There are what seem to be mortise holes in the rubblestone foundation of the south side, apparently for a earlier addition.

The area surrounding the house with a sculpted topography seems to have been landscaped formally at one time. The iron lattice fence around the house came from the old Conowingo Bridge.

impress the visitor (the rear or North facade, in contrast to the front, is relatively haphazard and unpretentious). Evidence of formal landscaping contributes to the sumptuous effect of a grand estate.

Not to be discounted, however, is the natural beauty of the site's topography and its value as a large farm, used for agricultural purposes since at least the beginning of the 19th century. An older barn located near the present barn, (#11) was torn down before the present owners purchased the farm in 1953. It is said to have been the largest barn in the county, with a hay mow in which a 4-horse team and hay wagon could turn around.



DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Their very large L shaped house, 2 1/2 stories, is 8 bays by 2 in the south-facing ~~house~~, and 3 bays by 2 in the wing running north along the east wall. A long one-story porch formerly ran across all but 2 bays of the house, but has been shortened. The slate roof has five dormers on the south, two on the east in the wing. There are four chimneys rising from fireplaces upstairs and down.

(Slightly separated from the house at the west is a stone building, one story.





 QUADRANGLE MAP





