This house is a rarity in Bel Air, a middle class double house produced by duplicating the front gable house. The floor plans are identical, and even the storage shed out back is divided right down the middle.

The house was built by entrepreneur Edward Ferry. He sold it to his mother, Barbara Dunnigan who kept the hotel at 33 Courtland. Their entangled financial empire came crashing down in a clot of lawsuits around 1900 and Augustine Lejeune bought the house for \$2245 at auction. She left it to her brother, General John Archer Lejeune, U.S.M.C.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This double Victorian house is at 628-630 Rock Spring Avenue in the Town of Bel Air, Harford County, Maryland. It is a four bay, two and a half story shiplap house with a steep slate gable roof and twin front gables. The front gables have standard size 2/2 double-hung sash windows. All the other windows are also 2/2 except for the two first story front windows (east) which are 4/4. Major windows have wooden louvered shutters. The two front doors are in the middle two bays of the front elevation. A two pane transom tops a one pane over two panel door in each case. The original turn doorbell is still in each door. The front porch has a hipped roof and is carried on chamfered posts with thin carved brackets. The balustrade has plain square balusters. A tongue and groove panel with a matching balustrade on top divides the north half of the porch from the south half. The house has two inside end chimneys with corbel caps.

The house has a wide two bay back building with a shed roof porch on the rear (west) elevation. The middle portion of the porch is enclosed and serves as a pantry for each half.

The two portions of the house are mirror images of each other. A living room, dining room, and kitchen with pantry complete the first story. A semi-enclosed staircase along the middle partition to the second floor which has two bedrooms and a large bath made from the third bedroom. The attic level has one large room. The woodwork in both houses is entirely plain.

The south half (630) has a fireplace in the southeast corner. It has exposed brick now (it had been covered for many years) and barn wood panelling above the shelf.

A board and batten, gable roofed storage shed with exposed rafters is to the west of the house. It is divided down the middle just like the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This Victorian double house is unique in Bel Air: the only double middle class house in Town. It was built by Edward Ferry in 1888 on land he had leased in 1885 from Mary Dallam (52/248). At the time he was living next door at 626 Rock Spring, the house that subsequently became the home of the Stevenson Archer family. Ferry was a local entrepreneur, a lumber merchant and builder. His mother, Barbara Ferry Dunnigan, owned and operated Mrs. Dunnigan's Hotel at 33 Courtland (now the County Extension Agent's Office). Ferry and Dunnigan built the Old Aegis Building (29 Courtland) and the frame building to the west (31 Courtland). Ferry built several houses around Town, lived in them a while and then sold them and built another. Among them were the first house at 520 Mast, the previously mentioned 626 Rock Spring, this house, 703 Roland, and possibly others. He owned the lumber yard at the railroad station that was sold to Hanway & Keen and then to McComas brothers.

He may have built this double house for his mother. She was a 37 year widow and hotelkeeper in 1869 when she got a license to marry Barney Dunnigan. Dunnigan ran a liquor store until Local Option put him out of business. He seems to have been a good old B'houy around Town. In 1900 he and his wife were separated and she was living in Philadelphia with her son Edward Ferry. Dunnigan died in Bel Air in 1906. It is possible that Ferry built this house when his mother left her second husband. At any rate he conveyed it and the lumber yard property to her in 1889 for \$6000 (64/190). Mrs. Dunnigan and Ferry got into a financial tangle around the turn of the century and everything was sold up as a result of the suit of the Jarrettsville Building Association. It was at this time that Ferry and his mother were said to be living in Philadelphia.

The property was sold at auction in 1904 to Miss Augustine L. Lejeune for \$2245 (113/444). Miss Lejeune was the sister of Major General John Archer Lejeune, (see below) and the property was ideally suited to her for her cousin Mrs. Stevenson Archer lived next door. She lived in the north half of the house and rented the south half. She left the property to General Lejeune (will 19/383), who in turn left it to his wife, Ellie Harrison Lejeune, and then to his daughter Ellie Murdaugh Lejeune Glennon. She sold it to the present owner, F. Worth Riley, in 1962 (591/526).



John Archer Lejeune (1867-1942) was born in Pointe Coupee Parish, Louisiana, January 10, 1867. The Harford County Archers have had a southern connection at least since Judge Stevenson Archer was Territorial Judge of Mississippi Territory in 1819. Lejeune attended Louisiana State University from 1881-84 and graduated from the Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1888. In 1889 he was shipwrecked off Samoa in the hurricane. In 1890 he became a Second Lieutenant in the U. S. Marine Corps. He commanded the Marines aboard the U.S.S. Cincinnati during the Spanish-American War and commanded a battalion in the Panama Canal Zone, 1903-04. He was at Vera Cruz in 1914 with the Expeditionary Force, returning to Washington to serve as Assistant to the Commandant 1915-1917. He was promoted to Brigadier General in 1916. In 1917 he was commander at Quantico, Va. and became a Major General in 1918. He arrived in France with the A.E.F. in June, 1918. He commanded various brigades in World War I, serving in the Meuse - Argonne, at St. Mihiel and at the Swiss Border. He took part in the occupation of Metz and Coblenz, returning to the United States in 1919 to assume command of the Second Marine Division. He was promoted to Major General in 1920. He served as Commandant of the Marine Corps from 1920 to 1929. He retired in 1929 and died in 1942.
