Capsule-summary

This is one of the older surviving residences in the small black community of Gravelly Hill, located west of Havre de Grace. This relatively small house is distinguished by a large cross gable on its main facade, a common architectonic device on vernacular dwellings of the 19th and even 20th century.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Bishop House is located on the north side of Gravelly Hill Road and faces south. It is a two story frame structure with a gable end roof (running east-west), and it rests on a rubblestone foundation. Although relatively narrow across the south elevation, it is four bays wide and has a prominent cross gable across the two middle bays. The house is one bay deep and has a two bay deep ell that is two bays wide, or half the width of the house. There are two front doors (2nd and third bays) on the south elevation. Windows are 6/1. A later one story shed roof porch extends across the south elevation. The house is clad with a variety of modern materials, primarily asphalt shingles in imitation of brick. However, wooden drop siding was observed on the north wall underneath the later material. There are two brick chimneys; one in the center of the main block, and one in the north end of the ell. It was not possible to view the interior at this time. The house is presently abandoned, and there are no apparent plans for any renovation work.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Bishop House is one of the older surviving residences in the Gravelly Hill community. Like most other black residences constructed in the late 19th or early 20th century, it is relatively plain and straightforward in plan, and is not unlike residences constructed by and for rural whites of the same period. However, not enough research and field work has been done in Harford County (as of 6-1981) to be able to draw specific conclusions about regional black architectural characteristics. Due to the fact that many of these older homes are inadequate by twentieth century standards, they have been abandoned and are in deteriorating condition. The possibility exists that they will quietly vanish without ever having been adequately recorded.

Gravelly Hills is apparently one of Harford County's older discrete black settlements. In fact, archival research (see 26/151 Harford Co. Land Records) shows that there were land transactions between whites and blacks in 1842 in this area. As of December, 1900, the village still has a number of older residents who have distinct memories about the past (social life, family life, farming, schools and churches). While much has been written about the white experience in Harford County, little is known, and even less is documented, about the blacks role here. More work in the Gravelly Hills area, including oral taping sessions, examination of personal memorabilia, as well as detailed recording of the remaining buildings would ensure that a vital part of Harford's local history would not be forgotten.


