Built in Richardson's Addition in 1932, the Foster House, 48 W. Gordon St., faces south in a block of houses of similar period constructed, as it is, of frame, save for one stone house [HA-1787], and set back among trees and shrubs. Originally 3 bays wide, this gable-roofed 2 story house is now 4 bays wide in two blocks compact and tidy, it has a shed-roofed front porch with balustrade and a single story shed-roofed addition (northwest) and a screened porch (northeast) as its only exterior decorations. Double hung sash windows complete the ensemble.

Building began west of Main St. in Richardson's Addition in the 1880s; it and the Hayes Addition begun at the same time are the oldest extensions of the town. It is a mix of styles from Victorian to brick rancher, and a mix of classes as well, with working-man's housing along the north and south edges and middle class homes through the center. Indian Hill, subdivided in 1931, was the western end of land attached to the Richardson home (where Harford Mutual Insurance Co. is today) and previously held out of Richardson's Addition. Main Little built the first house there in 1931 [HA-1790]. Joseph T. Foster built this vernacular house, the second, in 1932 as a simple 3 bay two story structure.

It is a mix of styles from Victorian to brick rancher, and a mix of classes as well, with working-man's housing along the north and south edges and middle class homes through the center.

Indian Hill, subdivided in 1931, was the western end of land attached to the Richardson home (where Harford Mutual Insurance Co. is today) and thus held out of Richardson's Addition. Main Little built the first house there in 1931 [HA-1790]. Joseph T. Foster built this vernacular house, the second, in 1932 as a simple 3 bay two-story structure.

Foster was the mortician partner in Dean and Foster, the furniture store and funeral parlor at 13 Main St. [HA-1427]. The house has been expanded west and north and is now the property of Foster's son, Joseph W. Foster, proprietor of Foster Funeral Home.

The west 2 story addition was done by the elder Fosters in the 1950s and the north, single story, addition by the younger Fosters in the late 1960s.

Joseph T. Foster became Nathan Dean's partner in 1922 on the death of Eddie Dean, the mortician. Foster continued the firm (which still included the furniture store in the late 1940s) from 1947 to 1957 when his son joined him in Joseph T. Foster & Son. In 1962 the firm became Foster Funeral Home under the direction of Joseph W. Foster.


