The Lee House, 330 W. Gordon, faces south on a narrow, tree-shaded lot in Richardson's Addition. Built in 1889, it is one of Bel Air's ubiquitous 2 story, 2 bay, front-gable Victorians with a front ell and a slate roof.

Building began west of Main St. in Richardson's Addition in the 1880s; it and the Hayes Addition begun at the same time are the oldest extensions of the town. It is a mix of styles from Victorian to brick rancher, and a mix of classes as well, with working-man's housing along the north and south edges and middle class homes through the center. This is one of the earlier houses built in the addition, although its like can be found all over town. The front-gable Victorian, with or without ell, was the premier style of choice in Bel Air from 1870 through about 1890, when it was replaced with Bel Air's own symmetrical version of the Queen Anne style.

The Lee House, 330 W. Gordon, faces south on a narrow, tree-shaded lot. Built in 1889, it is one of Bel Air's ubiquitous 2 story, 2 bay, front-gable Victorians with a front ell and a slate roof.

Now clad in white aluminum siding, it has 2/2 double-hung sash windows flanked by black plastic shutters, except for those in the gables. The hip-roofed front (south) porch wraps around the ell to meet the main block. It is carried on square posts, the middle two of which still have their simple carved brackets. The balustrade is recent. An enclosed porch with a shed roof on the rear contains a bath in the western half. A slate mantel decorates the south wall of the small living room. Upstairs are 3 bedrooms and a bath.

Entry is in the east bay of the front ell; it leads directly to the living room. To the rear (north) are an enclosed straight run staircase on the west and a transverse hall to the east which leads to a door in the side porch, reportedly originally the entrance. To the north lie the dining room (east) with a space heater backed by brick in the northeast corner, and the kitchen with pantry to the west. Behind that is the rear enclosed porch with bath. From the construction, it looks as if it was always enclosed.

Upstairs, there were originally 3 bedrooms. Part of the northwest one was taken to install the bath, but the southeast bedroom has recently been partitioned into 2, so there are still 3. Woodwork is plain throughout. The attic is unfinished.

This is one of the earlier houses built in the addition, although its like can be found all over town. The front-gable Victorian, with or without ell, was the premier style of choice in Bel Air from 1870 through about 1890, when it was replaced with Bel Air's own symmetrical version of the Queen Anne style. Built by William Lee in 1889, this house stayed in the Lee family until the late 1960s. Florist R. Henry Lee, William's son, had several greenhouses on the property.

William Lee's widow Josephine, who died in late July 1922, devised the property to her son Francis and her daughter-in-law Effie, Henry's wife, after leaving \$100 and \$250 to her sons Walter and Charles. A daughter mentioned in her obituary is not mentioned in the will. Since Harry and Effie had bought the lot next door to the east in 1915 but had not built on it by 1930, perhaps they lived in this house and cared for Mrs. Lee in her old age. In her will, marked "do not publish," Josephine Lee sounds disappointed, if not downright peeved. Francis, who died in 1942, left his share to Effie, as well. Probably she cared for him in his old age, too. He never married and seems always to have lived at home. Effie died before her husband, worried about who would take care of him. Her neighbor, Lillian Sauers, who lives at 124 West Gordon [HA-1792], took care of him, taking him hot meals and checking on his health. When he died, probably in the late 1960s (his will is dated 1968), Henry left the property to Mrs. Sauers. The house is, apparently, a monument to the nurturing skills and neighborliness of Effie Lee and Lillian Sauers.

Harold and Betty Potter bought the house from Mrs. Sauers in 1970. Betty Potter is the daughter of real estate agent Glen Tilley, who owned the Gore house, 122 West Gordon [HA-1791], three doors away. She and her sister, Virginia Torgerson, who lives in the house Effie and Henry ultimately built on their lot at 126 West Gordon [HA-1793], were raised in the Gore house. When the Potters divorced in 1983, Betty got the house, which she sold presently to Robert and Jean Gentry for \$55,000. That same year the Gentrys sold it to Bernard and Constance Gemmill for \$57,000. Both the Gemmills work at the Harford County Courthouse.


