The Rinehart House, 325 Webster St., is a shingled bungalow in a block of 5 houses, 3 of which are bungalows built in Ingleside between 1923 and 1925. Facing north, this 2 bay, 3 bedroom house has a large shed-roofed dormer front and rear with 3/1 double hung sash windows, single upstairs and over the stair in the east living room wall downstairs, paired elsewhere, all flanked by white shutters. The porch posts and rail balustrade and the single story addition to the rear are recent. The window groupings, the closed-string dog-leg staircase with square newel and balusters, and the large doorless opening between the living room and the dining room are typical of the style as built in Bel Air.

The early 1920s saw three new additions to the Town of Bel Air: Fulford Park (1922), Ingleside (1923), and Kenmore (1924). In each case the lots were sold at auction. Ingleside was subdivided by J. Edwin Webster and named for his home to the north. Contractor Harry Orsburn built this bungalow in 1924 and sold it to the McComas Brothers, proprietors of the lumber yard [HA-1443 and HA-1444] on North Main St. near the now demolished train station. Until the deaths of the brothers it remained a rental. It is a good example of the roomy, yet compact bungalow style as built in Bel Air.

The Rinehart House, 325 Webster St., is a shingled bungalow in a block of 5 houses, 3 of which are bungalows built between 1923 and 1925. Facing north, this 2 bay, 3 bedroom house has a large shed-roofed dormer front and rear with 3/1 double hung sash windows, single upstairs and over the stair in the east living room wall downstairs, paired elsewhere, all flanked by white shutters. The porch posts and rail balustrade and the single story addition to the rear are recent. The window groupings, the closed-string dog-leg staircase with square newel and balusters, and the large doorless opening between the living room and the dining room are typical of the style as built in Bel Air.

Entry is in the east bay of the front elevation and leads directly to the living room. Kitchen (east) and dining room (west) are to the south. The addition includes an extension to the kitchen, a half bath, and a family room with a stove which vents into a metal chimney on the west elevation. Three bedrooms and a bath upstairs complete this airy, compact interior.

The dark green shingle siding is asbestos. A shed-roofed stoop is over the door in the east elevation.

The early 1920s saw three new additions to the Town of Bel Air: Fulford Park (1922), Ingleside (1923), and Kenmore (1924). In each case the lots were sold at auction. Ingleside was subdivided by J. Edwin Webster and named for his home to the north.

Contractor Harry Orsburn built this bungalow in 1924 and sold it to the McComas Brothers, proprietors of the lumber yard [HA-1443 and HA-1444] on North Main St. near the now demolished train station. Until the deaths of the brothers it remained a rental. It is a good example of the roomy, yet compact bungalow style as built in Bel Air.

According to the Aegis (30 Oct 1924) the first occupant was "Miss McConnie, who is connected with the State Department of Health." Owner Harry Hinman (1968-1981), who worked with the Harford County Department of Education, added the family room and bath to the rear (south). Present owner Carroll Rinehart, a computer programmer at Social Security in Woodlawn, was raised across the back fence in the Rider House [HA-1814] at 326 East Broadway, where his sister, Dottie Basl, lives today. His brother owns another East Broadway house, which indicates that both the houses and the neighborhood retain their charm and usefulness after 70 years, as well as the distance one resident is willing to commute to be able to raise his children there.


