The Daneker-Broumel House, 333 E. Broadway, faces north on a large, deep lot in Ingleside. Built in 1923, this 2 story, 2 bay house 4-square has all elements of this popular style, and with the exception of stucco covering the clapboard on the first level, it is very little changed.

The early 1920s saw three new additions to the Town of Bel Air: Fulford Park (1922), Ingleside (1923), and Kenmore (1924). In each case the lots were sold at auction. Ingleside was subdivided by J. Edwin Webster and named for his home to the north. This house was built for Charles Danneker and his wife Anna Mae in 1923, making it one of the earliest in Ingleside. Its 4-square style was popular among middle class home builders in town for a few years before and after World War I.

The Daneker-Broumel House, 333 E. Broadway, faces north on a large, deep lot. Built in 1923, this 2 story, 2 bay house 4-square has all elements of this popular style, and with the exception of stucco covering the clapboard on the first level, it is very little changed.

The name of this style is expressive. From its rock-faced concrete block foundation, through a white first story and a shaggy shingled second level, now painted a dark green, through its hipped roof, this house stands four-square, its planes and movement contained in the box. The eye comes to rest with finality at the roof tip. The hipped-roof dormer in the front (north) has two 6 pane windows. Other fenestration is 3/1 double-hung sash, mostly single, although rear windows on the side elevations are double; they light the dining room (east) and kitchen (west). The hipped-roofed porch is carried on 3 simple wooden columns. The shed-roofed sun room on the rear and the stoop to the side entry (west) are, with the porch, the only projections from the basic box. Entry is in the west bay of the facade, through the original door with 3 long windows in the top, to a side hall with a closed string dog-leg oak stair, with square newel post and balusters along the west wall. Doors have a slight cornice. To the east lie the living room (north) and the dining room (south) with parquet floors. The living room has a white brick false fireplace flanked by a pair of short double windows. Doorways between the hall and living room and the living room and dining room are large and show signs of having had French doors. South of the dining room through an arched opening is a sun room. The windows are replacements. The side hall once extended through to the kitchen. Today it ends short of that, leading to a half bath (south) and side entrance.

The same complex oak woodwork adorns the 3 bedrooms upstairs. A small additional room contains the door to the enclosed attic stair. The attic is unfinished. The basement is paneled.

The early 1920s saw three new additions to the Town of Bel Air: Fulford Park (1922), Ingleside (1923), and Kenmore (1924). In each case the lots were sold at auction. Ingleside was subdivided by J. Edwin Webster and named for his home to the north. This house was built for Charles Danneker and his wife Anna Mae in 1923, making it one of the earliest in Ingleside. Its 4-square style was popular among middle class home builders in town for a few years before and after World War I.

Mr. Danneker was manager of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Co. in 1923. In 1952 the Dannekers sold the property to Sara Ellen Broumel, a widow. She died 7 Sept 1974, and one of her sons, Thomas, bought the property. He was formerly Bel Air Police Chief and is now a Lieutenant Colonel with the Harford County Sheriff's Office. He paneled the basement.

The current owners, Terry and Mary Jane Bell, bought the house in 1984 and have restored it, stripping years of dark paint from the oak woodwork. Changes include the removal of a door to the side hall in the kitchen to provide more wall space and replacing the windows in the sun room.
