The Thompson House, 430 E. Broadway, faces south on a narrow lot in Ingleside. A simple 2 bay, 2 story front gable house, it was a bit old fashioned when it was built as a rental in 1927, although the interior has some typical 1920s touches. While it is wider than most, its resembles shotgun style working-man's housing built all over town from the 1880s. Originally cedar shingled, it is now aluminum-sided.

The early 1920s saw three new additions to the Town of Bel Air: Fulford Park (1922), Ingleside (1923), and Kenmore (1924). In each case the lots were sold at auction. Ingleside was subdivided by J. Edwin Webster and named for his home to the north. This house was built by Ola Mae MacLean in 1927 as a rental, but she sold it shortly after it was completed to the James Thompsons. Its front-gable style was old-fashioned then, particularly in Ingleside, where bungalows and four-squares were more popular. Perhaps Miss MacLean was only interested in building basic housing, which this had been in Bel Air since the 1880s, because she intended to hold it as a rental.

While it is wider than most, it resembles shotgun style working-man's housing built all over town from the 1880s. Originally cedar shingled, it is now aluminum-sided.

Exterior projections include the front porch with its slightly hipped roof carried on 3 square posts and the enclosed, shed-roofed, 2 bay back (north) porch. Double-hung sash windows, 1/1, complete this simple exterior.

The entrance in the east bay of the facade (south) leads directly to the small living room. A closed-string, dog-leg stair with square newel and balusters rises along the east wall. A large opening leads to the dining room to the north. The renovated kitchen is to the east of the dining room. Upstairs are 3 bedrooms and a bath over the stairs. Woodwork throughout is plain, and the doors have 5 horizontal panels.


