The Peverley House, 419 Choice St., faces east, set deep on a wooded lot. Built in 1923, it is an unusual white shingled house of many gables and angles emphasized by a deep roof overhang. As seen from the rear, perhaps the most uncluttered way to view it, it resembles a bungalow with its gable roof broken by triple window shed dormers to the north and south. The entrance in the middle of 3 bays in the east elevation is thus in the gable end of the bungalow. The projecting porch in the north bay of the facade (now glass-enclosed) with a separate gable-pierced hip roof, breaks up the bungalow lines, and a 1980s single story hip-roofed bed and bath addition to the north in the rear makes the box even more varied, as does the enclosed shed-roofed back porch. Most windows are 6/6 double-hung sash, but small casements both up and down vary the fenestration, as well, and a broad exterior stone chimney (south elevation) and a narrower one of brick (west elevation) pierce the roof overhang and provide even more visual variety, as do the shifting shadows cast by the many trees.

Work began on a house for Sydney D. Peverley and his bride, Carolyn Harrison Peverley, on a lot "in the grove adjoining Judge and Mrs. William H. Harlan's property" in late April of 1925 and was finished in November, according to The Aegis. The young couple had been married in February of that year and had honeymooned in Bermuda. The house they built among the trees on Choice St. is unusual in the period for the visual variety of its planes and shifting gables, despite its being basically a bungalow with a wide roof overhang and the entrance in the end, rather than the middle, of the bungalow box. Its wood shingle exterior is now painted white, and the projecting porch on the north side, with its own roof gable and overhang, is glass-enclosed, which gives the house a cool and classical appearance, far from the shaggy warmth of the bungalow style. Mr. Peverley owned a saw mill; the Tupelo Poplar flooring and the rest of the wooden materials in the house came from his mill.

Most windows are 6/6 double-hung sash, but small casements both up and down vary the fenestration, as well, and a broad exterior stone chimney (south elevation) and a narrower one of brick (west elevation) pierce the roof overhang and provide even more visual variety, as do the shifting shadows cast by the many trees.

The floorplan is more regular but by no means symmetrical. Entering directly into the living room, one faces an open string straight run staircase with square posts and balusters and unusual brackets formed by strips of molding. The fieldstone fireplace flanked by bookcases topped by small paned casement windows is now encased in a white reeded colonial mantel. The dining room is to the rear through French doors. To the north of the living room is the enclosed porch, which now houses the owner's grand piano and more book cases. Behind and to the south are a den and the kitchen, reached by a hall that parallels the staircase. A hall from the kitchen leads to the bath and bedroom addition built for the owner's elderly mother. A short service hall links the dining room and kitchen; a small pantry with built in glass and paneled cupboards leads off the hall to the south. Floors are Tupelo poplar and the woodwork has a small bead at the bottom of the lintels and a cornice at the top. Mill work came from the saw mill of the first owner, Sydney Peverley. Six panel doors, where they show, and 5 panel, where they don't, complete the wood work.

Upstairs are 4 bedrooms, each pair linked by a bathroom. The basement is paneled in 1950s knotty pine.

Original elements include the pantry cupboards, a kitchen dresser, original tubs in the upstairs bathrooms, and one inset medicine cabinet flanked by original light fixtures.

The area on Choice Street became a family enclave. The couple had purchased the lot from Carolyn's parents, Edmund P.H. Harrison and Caroline W. Harrison, who built a house nearby (as yet unlocated) the following year. Mrs. Harrison was the sister of Bessie Webster Harlan, the wife of Judge Harlan, whose "grove" was mentioned in the Aegis article (and of J. Edwin Webster, the developer of Ingleside in 1923). They later sold some of their property to the south to their daughter, Charlotte Peverley Silver, and her husband, William L. Silver II. Mrs. Silver lives there today.

This is essentially a two family house. Mrs. Peverley died in 1973. Mr. Peverley lived there until his death in 1980, when the house passed to Donald and Mary Sudbrink. Mrs. Sudbrink owns the house currently.

The public rooms of the house are large and elegant, perfect for entertaining. According to the current owner, Charlotte Peverley Silver's wedding was held at home, and so many people crowded into the living room that the I-beam under it cracked.

The house is not much changed. The Sudbrinks added a bedroom-bath suite to the north off the kitchen in 1980 to accommodate Mrs. Sudbrink's elderly mother. The kitchen appears to have been renovated in the 1950s. It has metal cabinets from that period. The mantel in the living room is inspired by Colonial Williamsburg and may also date to the 1950s. The original fireplace can be seen under it. These alterations were done by the Peverleys.
