The Russell McComas House, 147 Williams St., faces west in a block of mixed styles ranging from front-gable Victorian to brick rancher, which is typical of Richardson's Addition. A small but immaculate example of Bel Air's clapboard bungalows, the house has three louvered windows in its shed-roofed front and rear dormers. A front gable-roofed porch carried on four simple round posts lends a touch of elegance to this simple 3 bedroom house. The enclosure of the shed-roofed back (east) porch is the only exterior alteration. An oddity is the placement of the staircase along the north (kitchen) wall of the dining room, but it is the typical closed-string single run stair with square newel and balusters.

Building began west of Main St. in Richardson's Addition in the 1880s; it and the Hayes Addition begun at the same time are the oldest extensions of the town. It is a mix of styles from Victorian to brick rancher, and a mix of classes as well, with working-man's housing along the north and south edges and middle class homes through the center. This rather plain clapboard bungalow was built in 1926 as a rental by contractor Harry Orsburn for the McComas Brothers, proprietors of the lumber yard [HA-1443, HA-1444] near the now demolished train station. [Compare the earlier shingled bungalow built by Orsburn for the McComases in Ingleside in 1923, HA-1806.] In 1929 they sold it to second cousin Russell McComas, who has lived there ever since.

An oddity is the placement of the staircase along the north (kitchen) wall of the dining room, but it is the typical closed-string single run stair with square newel and balusters.

Entry is in the middle bay of the front (west) elevation; it leads directly to the living room, which occupies the whole front of the house. Dining room (north) and kitchen (south) complete the first story. The 3 bedrooms are small and shaped by the slope of the roof. Double-hung sash windows are paired in the north elevation, as are all but one window in the south (the living room one). Wood sheet paneling was added to the living room, dining room and front hall in the 1950s. Woodwork is plain through-out. The doors have 5 horizontal panels.

This rather plain clapboard bungalow was built in 1926 as a rental by contractor Harry Orsburn for the McComas Brothers, proprietors of the lumber yard [HA-1443, HA-1444] near the now demolished train station. [Compare the earlier shingled bungalow built by Orsburn for the McComases in Ingleside in 1923, HA-1806.] In 1929 they sold it to second cousin Russell McComas, who has lived there ever since.

The only documented renter was Leland Reckord, brother to Gen. Milton Reckord, of Maryland's 29th Division. Leland was raised across the street at 162 Williams St. [HA-236] and later lived in one of the houses built by his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary J. Zimmerman, HA-1500, just a few doors north on Williams St., another example of the lasting appeal of Bel Air neighborhoods.

The enclosure of the back (east) porch and the application of sheet wood panels to the living room, dining room, and upstairs hall are the only alterations to the house, all of them by Russell McComas.


