

Gailey-Fox House
HA 1898

This stately two-story, frame L-shaped house is located on the west side of Main Street in the village of Cardiff, Maryland. Built in 1910, the L-shaped house is one of only two such houses in the town of Cardiff. This structure has a rear two-story T-appendage and shed-roofed enclosure which greatly increase the building's size. As typical of Victorian era structures, the house is replete with windows including two two-story bays, has a multiple-gable roof, and has remnant Victorian details. The use of slate in the roof and foundation attests to the town's dependence on the slate as the primary industry and life-blood.

This two-story, frame L-shaped house is located on the west side of Main Street in the village of Cardiff, Maryland. It is the larger and more elaborate of only two L-shaped houses in the town, the other being located on the west side of Chestnut Street just above this house. As typical of this style, the long part of the house has a gable roof paralleling the street it fronts. A short portion projects forward with its gable roof perpendicular to the main house gable roof and street, its gable with returns capping a two-story three-paneled bay window that occupies that forward-most end. A shed-roofed porch fills in the angle at the main, east facade. A two-story T-appendage projects from the rear of the building. The southern-most angle of this T-appendage contains a two-story shed-roofed enclosure. A modern, treated wood deck is built off this enclosure. Both the roof and foundation are made of the region's world-famous slate, the slate foundation however is finished in concrete.

The front two lower bays are articulated by the main entrance with multi-light door, transom, and sidelights in the south lower bay and another entrance in the north bay. (May be a multi-family dwelling) The building's standard 1/1 sash windows are in the upper two bays. The projecting portion of the L has double windows in the front upper and lower panels of the two-story bay, with long windows on the first-story and standard length windows of the second-story upper panels. A single window is centered at the projecting gable of the main facade. The south endwall of the long portion of the house has a two-story three-sided bay window with windows in all panels. The north endwall cannot be seen due to large evergreens against the house.

The T-appendage is two bays wide and of shallow depth, with windows located in the two upper and lower bays of the endwall. At the north angle, the rear wall of the long portion has single upper and lower windows in the north bay. The enclosure in the south angle has been modernized into an enclosed sunroom on the second-story where a porch with a balustrade used to be (as seen in a 1931 photograph from the Maryland Green Marble Quarry).

The L-shaped design, two-story bay windows, and multiple-roof lend to the building's adornment. Further embellishment exists in the detailing: lacy cut-out porch brackets, turned porch posts, scroll lintels, and simple cut-out brackets at the projecting gable. The building is sided with green asbestos shingles and trimmed in cream.

This stately, circa 1910 L-shaped house is one of only two such houses in the town of Cardiff. This structure has a rear two-story T-appendage and shed-roofed enclosure which greatly increase the building's size. As typical of Victorian era structures, the house is replete with windows including two two-story bays, has a multiple-gable roof, and has remnant Victorian details. Interestingly, this lot was first owned and built on by Dr. McCurdy, the builder of the other L-plan house on Chestnut. The use of slate in the roof and foundation attests to the town's dependence on the slate as the primary industry and life-blood. The sister towns of Cardiff, Whiteford, and Delta (PA) developed primarily from the area's tremendous slate quarrying industry.

Originally owned by Thomas Hawkins (farmer) in a patented land grant known as "Hawkins Chance", this land was part of the tract sold by the Hawkins family to Rowland Parry, a Welsh quarry owner who operated one of the first prominent commercial quarries in the area. It was Parry who exhibited Peach Bottom slate in the London Crystal Palace exposition in 1850, winning it international recognition as the world's finest slate. "Hawkins Chance" was divided and sold in pieces, passing mostly through the hands of Parry's relatives and countrymen in various forms. The parcel of 17 acres that created this lot was sold to the South Delta Land Company in 1896 through an Equity Case on behalf of Parry's great niece. As with this house, most of the structures at the north end of Cardiff were built during the decades at the turn of the century.






