

MacNabb House  
HA 1927

This two and a half story frame house is located on the uphill east side of Chestnut Street, overlooking the village of Cardiff, Maryland. The house is a large four bays wide with a two-story service wing offset slightly to the south of the building's rear side. Originally, the main house was three bays with the cross gable centered on the steep gable roof. A major two-story addition to the building's north gable wall widened the structure to the present four bays.

The house is commonly known as the MacNabb House for the well-respected lawyer and his family who resided here from 1910 to the mid-fifties. The major addition to the main house is attributed to the MacNabb family. In deference to Charles MacNabb, the street below this house and perpendicular to Chestnut was named for him.

This two and a half story frame house is located on the uphill east side of Chestnut Street, overlooking the village of Cardiff, Maryland. A granite wall retains the ridge slope at the property's street edge, and a small barn is located to the rear of the house. The house is a large four bays wide with a two-story service wing offset slightly to the south of the building's rear side. A cross gable is located above the central southern bay, with an interior chimney rising above. The foundation is of the region's renowned slate, however the original slate roof has been replaced by modern asphalt shingles. A deep porch with a shallow hip-roof spans the west, main facade.

Numerous alterations to the house have occurred over time. Originally, the main house was three bays wide with the cross gable with returns centered on the steep gable roof. A major two-story addition to the building's north gable wall widened the structure to the present four bays, with a shed-roof dormer to the north providing visual balance to the cross gable. The original north service ell contained a double porch on the south side, both of which have been finished to provide increased interior space. In addition, a one-story shed-roof sunroom extends the length of the service wing farther eastward. The deep porch which runs the length of the main facade most likely replaced a more narrow porch.

Sided with cedar shingles, the main facade is four bays across in both the upper and lower stories, with the main entrance located at the south bay. All windows of the main house are 1/1 sash, with working shutters at single windows. A single window is centered at the cross gable. On the left gable, a secondary entrance flanked by double windows is located in the posterior half of the first story, with a single window positioned toward the front. Two double windows and a single 1/1 in the upper story compliment the lower bays, and a single window is centered at the gable. The south gable contains a two-story bay to the east and a single window centered at the gable. No openings were built into the short rear wall of the main house.

Though two stories in height, the rear service wing is shorter than the main segment of the house. The southern exposure of the two-story service ell and first story addition contain numerous openings, to include an additional secondary entrance and four full-length multi-paned windows. Original to the building is a second story shed-roof sunporch at the aftermost elevation.

The interior space of the main house is of a three room plan, with a parlor and side stair comprising the anterior half of the first floor and posterior half divided into two rooms. The second floor is made up of a side hall and banastered stair, two side bedrooms, and bath. Kitchen, utility, and living space occupy the service wing first floor, with a second bath, an unusual open nursery area with built-in crib, and narrow sunroom located on the second floor.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

Similar to four other houses on this uphill side of Chestnut Street, this large circa 1905 house was originally three bays wide with a center cross gable on the steep gable roof of the main facade. An early, large two-story addition widened the main house to its present four bays, thus altering its visual relationship to the four houses of the same plan. As with most of the structures in this slate quarrying region, coursed slate forms the foundation and full basement under the original house. A coursed slate crawl space under the addition indicates its early building date, as use of slate waned in the late twenties. Large rooms, high ceilings, and numerous windows characterize the interior of this turn-of-the-century home.

The house is commonly known as the MacNabb House for the well-respected lawyer and his family who resided here from 1910 to the mid-fifties. The major addition to the main house is attributed to the MacNabb family. In deference to Charles MacNabb, the street below this house and perpendicular to Chestnut was named for him.

Five small pieces form this 1.35 acre parcel, with the original source as the patented land tract of "Hawkins Chance". Originally owned by Archibald Hawkins, the tract was located atop the slate ridge and was sold in pieces to Welsh immigrants who came to the area seeking fortune in slate quarrying. The tract of 74 acres 5 perches had at least one quarry within its bounds and formed much of the northern village of Cardiff.


