DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The two-story stone farmhouse located on the Gardner property just east of Craigs Corner Road is five bays wide across the west entrance facade and two stories in height. Like other buildings in the area, it is constructed of local fieldstone laid in rubble courses and pointed with a very whitish mortar molded to a ridge in the interstices between stones (as at Rock Run Mansion, HA-192). All four corners are quoined in accordance with local practice, mostly by means of large granite pieces which as elsewhere are reserved for these ornamental details. The gable roof is covered in slate shingles on the principal block while the gable roof of the one-story stone addition at the north end is sheathed in asphalt tile. The two end chimneys on the main block are executed in brick and appear to have been recently repaired. According to the present tenant the southern chimney pertains to a stove flue and is of relatively recent construction.

The west facade's five bays consist of a central raised doorway, approached now by five concrete steps, flanked by two windows on either side. The original six-panel door surmounted by a four-light transom remains in situ, though the surround is somewhat obscured by a storm door. The windows are 6/6 double hung sash with timber surrounds composed of three moldings (two fascias separated by a bead); atop each is a granite lintel, inset and flush with the wall while the granite sills are slightly projecting. At ground level, below the window openings are four basement windows, each casement with two lights and each topped by a scaled down version of the granite lintels. On the second story are five windows exactly like those on the first floor spaced evenly above the first floor apertures. Located a few inches above the lintels of these windows is the boxed cornice resting on a strip of triple moldings and a plain fascia both of which stop at graduated intervals a few inches shy of each cornice corner (a treatment familiar to contemporaneous structures such as Rock Run Mansion). A rust colored paint has been applied to this woodwork, but it does not cover it uniformly.

The south gable end is undifferentiated except for two small rectangular windows in the gable.

The east facade is four bays wide with a doorway on axis with the front entrance flanked by two windows to the south and one to the north. Another original six-panel door remains with raised, paneled jambs. Due to the upward slope of the ground toward the east, this door is accessible by only one platform step. The windows are detailed exactly as on the west facade. Four windows exist on second story level directly above their first story counterparts. The cornice and attendant moldings are executed also exactly as their opposite numbers on the west front.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The following information is excerpted from material collected by Paul Penrod in 1976. The attached title search was also executed by him at that time.

The Henry Stump house is situated on the adjacent tracts known as Lines Tents and Line Addition, properties area land baron John Stump purchased from Thomas Harrison in 1783. John Stump conveyed this particular parcel to his brother as is evidenced by the 1783 Tax List, citing Henry Stump as owner of 236 acres of Lines Tents, 50 acres of Eightrupp and 13 1/4 acres of Tripple Union.

The 1798 Tax List indicated Henry had prospered, his holdings increased to 459 acres and situated on his estate a 24' X 18' stone house with cellar, a 17' X 17' stone kitchen and a 22' X 16' frame apartment. The stone kitchen could have been detached originally and later connected with the main house.

Following Henry Stump's death in 1815, the property remained in the Stump family until 1844 when it passed to Henry's daughter-in-law's family, the Harlans who were in possession until 1920.

The Martinet map of 1878 lists Dr. David Harlan as owner. (Harlan served as the Medical Director of the United States Navy, and was a naval surgeon from 1835 until 1871, serving in both the Mexican and Civil War.)

This structure, though altered on the interior, is an important exponent of circa 1800 stone farmhouses, fast disappearing, which once characterized Harford County stylistic traits such as corner quoining and the simple woodwork trim resemble those of other area buildings, and because of its substantial scale and setting in rural farmland with attendant graveyard associated with the house, the Henry Stump House is an exterior which justifies continued efforts toward its preservation.

The north gable end is joined to a subsequent stone (kitchen) wing which projects forward several feet to the east where a corner window opening has been blocked up. The addition contains three adjoining rooms and its entrance wall is recessed several feet from the west wall of the main block. According to the present tenant, there was once a passage connecting the north gable end of the main building with the addition. The north gable end also features a watertable defined by a large horizontal granite stone at the northwest corner above the bulkhead entrance to the cellar.

Also, the tenant confirmed that her father massively renovated the interior several years ago so that little interior woodwork remains. The plan is characterized by a central stair hall between two large square rooms on the first floor and a second floor with five bedrooms off a connecting corridor.

Attached to the property are several outbuildings including a smokehouse to the northeast of the house which is contemporary with it, constructed of stone with quoined corners; hand wrought nails are visible in the roof timbers and a doorway exists with a rough carved keystone between two larger chunks of stone constituting its lintel.

The Gardner complex also encompasses a modern barn built on an older stone foundation, a stone springhouse some distance from the main dwelling, a frame storage shed, two hog pens and a garage.

South of the house and close to the more recent outbuildings is an old graveyard plot containing some of the members of the Stump and the Archer families.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is an eastern-facing home of two stories, with an original stone one-story addition on the southern end. Adjoining this extension is a more modern addition, also one story. The ridgeline of the addition is flush with the western wall of the main house for an "off center" appearance. The original section's walls are coursed stone with quoined corners and stone sills and lintels. The two-story part is five bays by two, although there are only attic windows on the ends. The addition measures four bays by two, most of this consisting of the original part. One window on the exposed northern edge of the wing has been covered over. All of the windows are 6 X 6 and have been replaced. There are two collars on either side of the main entrances on the eastern and western facades, and there are four such windows on either side of the wing. Opposite doors, connected by a thru-hall, are located on the eastern and western embrasures of the main house, the eastern one having a panelled inset and a three-light transom. A third door is sited on the extreme southern side, while the last is positioned on the southern end of the new wing. The main roof is a slate gable-flank with a decorative box cornice and frieze. Two brick chimneys are positioned on the main roof, the southern one being an inside-end and the northern one being a flush-end. The wing's roof is asphalt and has a new block flue, located on the western slope's interior. The cellar way is situated near the southwestern corner of the main house.

A smokehouse is located just west of the previously described building. The walls are of the same stone, and there are no windows. The single door is on the western side, and a cistern is located on the southern face. The gable-flank roof has old eaves and wood shingles.

South of the house and close to the more recent outbuildings is an old graveyard plot containing some of the members of the Stump and the Archer families.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is believed to be a veteran of at least 180 years, built by Henry Stump. The tract where it stands is part of what once was called Lines Tents and Lines Addition, a huge mass of land obtained from Thomas Harrison by John Stump in 1783. This part of the tract was conveyed to Henry Stump by his brother. The 1783 Tax List shows Henry as owning 236 acres of Lines Tents, fifty acres of Eightrupp and 13 1/4 acres of Tripple Union. The 1798 Tax List shows his property as consisting of 459 acres, with a 24 X 18 stone house with cellar, a 17 X 17 stone kitchen and a 22 X 16 frame apartment. Judging from this information, the present wing may have been a separate structure at one time. Henry was not as prominent as his brother, although he did have considerable landholdings. After his death in 1815, the property stayed in his family until 1844, when his daughter-in-law's family, the Harlans, took it over and owned it until 1920. The Martenet map shows the 1878 owner to be Dr. David Harlan. Harlan served as the Medical Director of the United States Navy, and was a naval surgeon from 1835 until 1871, serving in both the Mexican and the Civil War.





