**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

The Seaman house is a small, rather modest stone dwelling which has been expanded by means of modern frame additions and renovated on the interior to assume grander proportions. The stone section consists of local fieldstone laid in random courses with generous amounts of mortar mixed with a large proportion of sand for an excessively grainy look and texture. All four corners are quoined with huge granite blocks which contrast dramatically with the surrounding tan stone. The wood trim is painted a light gray.

The stone portion's north facade, which faces a large open field bounded by six acres of pines, contains four window openings, two on the first story and two slightly smaller on the second story (the northwest one located slightly off center in relation to its downstairs neighbor). All windows consist of 6/6, double hung sash, and all are further articulated by granite lintels and slightly projecting timber sills. The granite lintels on the first story windows are chamfered along the edge that meets the surround; on the second story windows they are flush with the surrounding wall. The north facade window surrounds, are currently obscured by the recent installation of storm windows. (However, the surrounds are exactly the same as on the south facade, discussed below.) Crowning the facade is a plain fascia running the length of the facade but stopping about 6" short of each corner. Atop this is a boxed cornice characterized by relatively short returns.

Adjoining the north facade but with its wall recessed a couple of feet from it is the frame addition which is also two stories but with lower ceiling heights than the main block. Both stories are sheathed in clapboarding, painted beige, and covered with a gable roof of asphalt shingling as is the new roof in the main section. Closest to the stone block is a modern door flanked by three 6/6, double hung windows. Sheltering this entrance is a pent which extends beyond the west end second story of the house to accommodate a shed addition. On the second story one smaller 3/3 casement window is located above the doorway.

On the east gable end is a one-story porch extending the length of this side, a modern feature possibly reusing some older members such as the four chamfered piers (detailed like those found at porches on Rock Run Mansion, HA-192) and the two half-piers, also chamfered and resting on wooden blocks abutting the wall at the porch corners. (The foundation of the porch is cement block and the plank flooring is recent.) Above the first story are four windows, two in the second story positioned slightly closer to the corners than the pair of smaller windows within the gable area. All four windows are 6/6, double hung with granite lintels and slightly projecting, simple timber sills. (The lintel on the

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The following information is quoted from material collected by Paul Penrod in 1976. The title search attached was also executed by him at that time.

The Seaman-Smith house is located upon two adjacent and sizable tracts of property known as Lines Tents and Lines Addition, both of which were purchased by John Stump from Thomas Harrison in 1783. Stump in turn sold a portion of the original Harrison land in 1813 to Nathaniel Smith, a descendant of Susquehanna ferry operator Thomas Smith. The present stone structure was built in 1860 by Charles Corman Smith who also built a house on Wilkinson Road, in the vicinity, for his one married son. He later allowed his large number of unattached children to remain in this house while he moved to John Stump's former dwelling at Stafford in the 1890s.

This modest, well-sited stone farmhouse is enhanced by the extensive planting of trees and other landscaping done by Mr. Seaman who worked for the Soil Conservation Service for many years.

second story northeast window is deteriorating rapidly and needs attention.) A redesigned principal entrance door flanked by fluted pilasters, another modern alteration, is located at the northeast corner with another identical 6/6 double hung window on the other side of the fireplace wall. A rakeboard corresponds in size, and plainness to the front fascia.

The south facade is articulated by four windows which correspond to those on the north facade except they are aligned evenly. Again, the first story windows are slightly larger than those above. There is a similar 8" distance between the top of the second story lintels and the fascia. All 6/6, double hung windows have granite lintels but all are flush with the wall. As the ground slopes downward towards the south, there is room on this elevation for the cellar to have a small 3/3 casement window with granite lintel to the southwest and a bulkhead (replacement, in block foundation) entrance to the southeast.

The moldings in the window's surrounds (readable on the north facade) consist of the following, proceeding from the outermost to the rails and stiles of the window: fascia, bead, recessed fascia, recessed bead.

The west gable end is substantially obscured by subsequent additions to the house. A single 6/6, double hung window exists in the gable with a thicker timber lintel and surround with one bead instead of two as elsewhere described. The rakeboard here is somewhat narrower than at the east end.

The interior which has undergone substantial restoration nevertheless possesses some original features, specifically: several six-panel doors with their original hardware and simple timber surrounds intact. The two rooms which once constituted the first floor have been turned into one large living room by the removal of a partition wall. The original mantel of the centrally placed gable end fireplace has been replaced by a late eighteenth century mantel taken from a stone farmhouse in Allegany County, Pennsylvania, characterized by three triglyph design and molded surround. Upstairs in the stone section are three bedrooms and a bath.

Two outbuildings exist in overgrown and inaccessible areas to the south of the house: a small board and batten barn with wood shingle roof and a stone, gable-roofed springhouse.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

This southeast-facing structure was originally of two sections. The western end is a two-storied uncoursed rubble affair, and east of it is a "short" two-story frame wing. A third modern addition has been built east of the older frame wing. The stone portion has bays of two by two, while the older frame addition is two bays by one. The corners of the stone walls are quoined, and there are stone lintels over the doors and windows. The windows are 6 X 6, although the cellar lights on the eastern and southern sides of the stone house are 3 X 3's. One entrance is located on the northeast side of the old addition, presently enclosed by the recent addition. A second door is situated on the eastern wall of the old frame addition, while the third, the main entrance, is located on the southeast face of the stone building. This main entrance sports side panels and three-pane side lights. The roof is a gable front with an asphalt roof and the box cornices and angled-in eaves are new. A three-bay, hipped-roof porch is located on the southeastern side, embracing the main entrance. A more recent sun porch is located on the western facade of the frame wing. The single chimney, an interior type on the eastern end of the stone house, is of new brick.

Originally, the old frame wing served as the kitchen and the utility section of the house. The living room, located on the first floor of the stone house, was at one time partitioned. The central fireplace is located in the living room against the southeast wall. Such older features, as box locks and narrow stairs have been retained. Hand-hewn beams and logs can be seen from the cellar, and a bricked-up arch is under the fireplace. The cellar door is on the western side of the stone house.

West of the house and at the bottom of the hill is a stone springhouse that faces to the east. The tin roof is a new one.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The tracts that this place is located upon are called Lines Tents and Lines Addition and were involved in a huge purchase by John Stump from Thomas Harrison in 1783. This tract came into the hands of Nathaniel Smith in 1813, when John Stump sold part of Harrison lands to Smith. Nathaniel Smith was a descendant of Thomas Smith, the ferry operator. Charles Coleman Smith built the existing structure in 1860 and erected a second on nerby Wilkinson Road for his one married son. Having a large number of unmarried children, he allowed them to live in this house, while moving to John Stump's old house at Stafford in the 1890's.




