Harness maker James Fulton built this house in 1845 at the same time he built his shop to the south. It is probably typical of the three bay center hall houses built in Bel Air before the Civil War, but it is the only one of its kind left. It resembles the Van Bibber House, 303 S. Main Street, but it has a more coherent design because the main block was built all at once. By 1904 it had acquired an ell in back. By 1930 the front porch and the present back building were in place. The present owners are descendants of James Fulton.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two and a half story three bay clapboard house is at 6 S. Main Street in the Town of Bel Air, Harford County. Currently, the house is composed of the front building twenty feet wide which has a gable roof and a back building three bays wide with a hipped roof. The front building is clearly the original part of the building. By 1904 the house had a single story 20 foot ell just south of center as a back building. The ell had a porch along the south elevation. There was a single story room addition about 15 feet wide on the south elevation of the main block and there was no front porch. By 1930 the back building and its south side porch had been built. The front porch and the two bay single story gable roofed addition to the south of the main building appear to be additions made between 1930 and 1960.

The gable ends of the main building are blind save for a pair of 4 pane casements in the gables. The windows of the second story front of the main building are 6/6 double-hung sash. A pair of single pane windows the same size flank the entrance in the first story. They appear to date to the use of the building as the Bridal Shop. Front windows have wooden louvered shutters. The south addition has a single pane window (north) and a 6 pane over 3 panel door (south).

The main entrance is in the middle bay of the main building. A red door with two long panels is flanked by 4 pane over panel side lights. There is no transom. The front porch is five feet wide. Square posts with a filet at the neck support a cornice with a dentil band just atop the plain frieze. Side balustrades are composed of lathe in an X pattern.

The back building is four bays by three. It has 1/1 windows except for the 2/2 windows in the two gable roofed dormers in the rear (west) plane of the hipped roof and a 6/6 and a pair of 9 pane casements in the south bay (1st story) of the west elevation. A hipped roof back porch, now glassed in with multiple pane windows is in the middle two bays of the back (west) elevation, first story. Another porch, shed roofed, is along the south side of the back building.

Despite the age and importance of the building the owners were unwilling to make the interior available to the surveyor.

While the house gives a vaguely Greek Revival impression today, it originally must have looked like the Van Bibber House, a vernacular "colonial" house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This well preserved Greek-Revival home set back from Main Street on a shaded lot which is fenced in front with a white picket fence is one of two remaining houses in Bel Air's downtown area which retain their domestic character. In 1845 when harness maker James A. Fulton built the house Bel Air's Main Street was a pleasant, quiet, tree shaded street largely residential in character. Bel Air was a southern county court-house town with about 250 people in the pike between Washington and Philadelphia. As befitted a town whose population expanded rapidly during court days, there were more hotels than there were stores, and the stores were domestic in architecture, domestic and commercial buildings being not yet differentiated in style. The Fulton-Young House and the Graham-Crocker House at 30 North Main are the only two reminders in the downtown area of this gracious and more slowly-paced era before the Civil War and the coming of the railroad. This is the only lot in the original plat of the Town of Bel Air that has not been broken up.

In May of 1840 Benjamin Bond sold this lot, lot #5 on the Town Plat, to George N. Warden for \$220 (23/351). Warden died in 1842 in debt to Lee Magness for \$1000. In May 1842 Magness sued to recover the debt (Box 694, Harford County Equity Records). The pleading makes no mention of any improvements on lot #5. In May 1845 Augustus Bradford of Baltimore, Bel Air native and subsequent Civil War governor of Maryland, acting as trustee in the equity case, sold the lot at public auction to James A. Fulton for \$120. The price suggests there were no improvements. The national economic crisis which began in 1838 and continued to 1846 in many areas probably had no particular effect on these two sales (although it may have caused Warden's financial problems in 1837) because Warden paid more for the property in 1840 when the depression was at its depth than Fulton did in 1845 when the situation was substantially better. Fulton probably built the house and the harness shop on the lot to the northeast in 1845 because the Harford Democrat of January 1, 1892, noting Fulton's retirement, stated that he had been in business for half a century. Some financial difficulty that has not been traced caused Fulton to lose the property because in 1863 he leased it back from attorney Otho Scott (14/41) for \$66 a year. The lease describes "all that house and lot" where Fulton lived and stipulated, as was usual, that the houses" were to be insured. Finally in 1891 Fulton was able to buy his property back; by 70/439 he paid \$1100 to Daniel Scott, Cornelia his wife, and Annie G. Winchester, widow, and regained the fee simple to his property. He retired from harness making the following year "without a

blemish on a good name," selling his shop to John Bauer who had worked for him for twenty years. He died in 1897 at the age of 86, leaving three surviving children, Mrs. John S. Young of Bel Air, and Mrs. Joseph Weizel and John A. Fulton of Cumberland.

Mr. and Mrs. Young lived in the house. Mrs. Young died in 1905 leaving her husband John Young, her brother John A. Fulton, and her sister Susan Weizel surviving. A law suit (Weaver vs. McGonigall, 170 Md. 212) decided that J. Harvey Scarborough and H. Miller Scarborough were the residuary heirs of John Fulton. Florence Young Maulsby, Elizabeth C. Smithers, and Minnie Margaret Smithers also had a claim on the property as residuary devisees of John S. Young, the husband of Fulton's daughter Mary. In 1941 the Scarboroughs sold their shares to Florence Maulsby and the Misses Smithers for \$10,000 (267/332).

The house was a dress shop for some years until 1974. This probably accounts for the large window in the north bay of the front (east) elevation. In 1974 it housed the Centennial Commission for Bel Air's town centennial. It is vacant at present.



THIS DEED, made this 4th day of August A.D. 1941 by H. MILLER SCARBOROUGH and MARY B. SCARBOROUGH, his wife, and J. HARVEY SCARBOROUGH, widower.

SMITHERS and MINNIE MARGARET SMITHERS, their heirs and assigns, all the right, title and interest of said grantors or of those claiming, by, from or under them in and to all that tract or parcel of land situate in the Town of Bel Air, Harford County, and the State of Maryland, and described as follows: Beginning for the same at the southwesterly intersection of Pennsylvania Avenue and Main Street at an iron pin driven in the ground at said intersection and running thence in a southerly direction along the westerly side of Main Street 76.21' more or less to a lease-

hold lot of ground formerly owned by John L. Young and Millicent L.
