One of the best Queen Anne houses in Bel Air, the house was built in 1879 by Jacob Bull, Bel Air's Master Builder. Originally a smaller and simpler house, it was expanded in the Queen Anne manner in the 1890's for Thomas Hall Robinson. Particularly interesting are the posts and brackets on the front porch and the two story bay window to the east.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This large and irregular Queen Anne style house is at 112 E. Broadway in the Town of Bel Air, Harford County, Maryland. It is two and a half stories high, five bays wide, sided in shiplap. Interior evidence and local legend suggest that the original house was smaller and less ornate. It was probably a (east) side hall plan which would be the western three bays. Queen Anne houses of this size were not built in Bel Air in 1879. Thomas Robinson probably added the eastern two bays and the Queen Anne style in the 1890's. The house is composed of the front block one room deep and the back building, originally one room wide and two rooms deep. The kitchen was removed by the Cassillys and the (west) side porch was enclosed to serve as a kitchen.

The slate gable roof has a steep pitch with several ridge lines and gables. Its pitch is broken by four shed roofed dormers, one in back, and two on the east side.

The front (south) elevation has three bays on the west (topped by the dormer) and two bays to the east which project slightly and are topped by a gable with fish scale shingles and three windows, the center being larger.

The front (south) porch is hipped roofed, carried on groups of chamfered posts on blocks. The carved brackets are pierced by a trefoil. Similar brackets without the trefoil are at right angles to the posts and support the porch cornice.

The west elevation of the front block is blind save for a pair of widely spaced windows on the shingled gable.

The east elevation has a two story hexagonal bay window in its south bay. The second story is slightly stepped back and a dentil band runs under the molded cornice at each level. North of that is a two bay section with a dormer centered (the other dormer is centered over the bay window). The first story is a small porch carried on chamfered posts.

The rear (north) elevation is quite irregular, showing main block, back building, and additions and enclosed porches. The shed roofed addition and the covered ramp entrance (east of center) occupy the position of the demolished kitchen.

The fenestration is mixed. The back windows are 6/6; the first story front windows are the long 2/4; other windows are Queen Anne: central pane surrounded by many small panes up and single large pane down. Major windows front & (east) side have wooden louvered shutters. The windows of the double bay once had them too.

The main entrance is in the center bay of the south elevation. A pair of glass over panel doors are topped by a tripartite transom with a long center pane flanked by small windows composed of two vertical panes.

A pair of corbelled-cap chimneys break the roofline in the front block, one inside the west gable and one astride the ridge line in the middle of the east section.

As it stands today the front block has a center hall with a closed string dog-leg Queen Anne staircase rising against the east wall. The

BUILDER/ARCHITECT Jacob Bull

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house, or a portion of it, is the second house Jacob Bull built on the large lot he and his wife Mary bought from Dr. William Munnikhuisen in 1877 (36/41). The house next door to the west was built in time to appear on the 1878 Map, where it was listed as Bull's residence. In March 1879 Bull began to build this house. To do so he mortgaged his house to Stevenson A. Williams for \$800. In 1881 he sold his residence to James H. File for \$1,100 (42/456), possibly because he had not sold this house. One speculates that Bull then lived in this house, which was, if not smaller, then probably less ornate, until he sold it to Thomas H. Robinson in 1885 (53/298). The house probably consisted of the west three bays with the back portion and had a (east) side hall plan.

Thomas Hall Robinson was born near Hickory, March 2, 1860, the son of Dr. Samuel S. Robinson and his wife Mary. He studied law in the office of Henry D. Farnandis, the grandson of Henry Dorsey. In September 1884 he married Clara Cain, the daughter of James M. Cain of Hickory. It was in February of the next year that they bought this house.

In 1891 and again in 1901 Robinson was elected to the Maryland Senate. Prominent in Democratic party politics, he was five times a delegate to the National Convention, Chairing the delegation in 1920 and 1924. He was Maryland Counsel for the Pennsylvania Railroad and, after 1894, President of the Second National Bank of Bel Air. He was twice elected Attorney General of Maryland (1923, 1927) and was running for re-election when he died.

The Robinsons had five children: Mary Lucille (Mrs. John A. Robinson), Mary Madeline (Mrs. Howard S. O'Neill), Mary Elizabeth (Mrs. Francis J. Mc Ginnis of Clifton Springs, N.Y.), Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., and Cloe (Mrs. Ross B. Cameron).

A quarter share of the house passed to Lucille Robinson on the death of Clara (will 21/489). Lucille was the daughter of Mary Lucille who married Judge John A. Robinson. She died in childbirth and Lucille (the wife of Judge Albert Close) was reared by her grandparents in this house. Her father, John Robinson, was a native of Baltimore City, where he attended City College and Johns Hopkins University (B.A., 1895). After attending the University of Maryland Law School, he was admitted to the Harford County Bar in 1897. He served in the Spanish-American War as a First Lieutenant in the Fifth Regiment, Maryland National Guard. After the War he moved to Harford, where his father had a farm. He practiced law and was active in the Republican Party. From 1909 to 1921 he was clerk of the Circuit Court of Harford County. Declining to run again, he bought the Bel Air Times, which he edited for a quarter of a

balusters are turned, the newels are square and fluted up to a carved block. Knobs adorn the tops, and pendants formerly depended from corners. The staircase continues in the same design but smaller scale up to the third level. The first floor woodwork is molded; a christian door leads left (west) to the study and right (east) to the parlor. The parlor mantel is a typical Victorian piece with round arched opening, spandrels and cartouche. The body is slate; the shelf is marble. The bay window lights the parlor. The study mantel is a mid-20th century brick replacement.

Penelled wainscotting adorns the west wall of the hall north of the study door.

The dining room is north of the hall, its axis running east and west for the width of the house. A large fireplace was taken out by the Cassillys, replaced by built in cupboards from floor to ceiling (west) and panelling with a shelf that serves as a buffet. The panelling on the doors and dining room and hall walls was taken from the west side porch which the Cassillys enclosed and turned into the kitchen after they removed the old kitchen north of the dining room. The dining room has a door in each wall: south to the front hall, west to the kitchen, east to the east side porch, and north to a hall with a bathroom to the right and to the north the ramp entrance.

Upstairs the woodwork is plain. The two bedrooms in the east block are the main bedrooms, up three steps from the hall. A Victorian mantel is in the south bedroom. The second story has three bedrooms, a bath, and a laundry room. A stained glass window (blue and translucent) is in the landing to the third floor where there are three bedrooms.

century. He sold it in 1941 and devoted himself to his law practice. He was appointed to an interim term as Associate Judge of the Third Circuit in 1936. He died in Bel Air in 1957.

Thomas Hall Robinson added to this house, probably in the 1890's, judging by the Queen Anne style it now bears. He probably added the east two bays and changed the staircase and enlarged the dining room and added plumbing.

Mrs. Close and Howard S. O'Neill, trustee for Mrs. Clara Robinson's estate, sold the property to John T. Fitzpatrick in 1950 (345/559). The Fitzpatricks sold it to the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Cassilly in 1958 (515/386). The Cassillys have made changes since they moved in. They removed the portion of the back building which served as the kitchen and enclosed the west side porch which is now the kitchen. They added a bathroom downstairs in the northeast corner of the house and added a ramp entry next to it because one of their children is confined to a wheelchair. The fireplace in the study (the southwest room) was altered and a modern brick mantel was installed. Solid wooden panelling was removed from the west side porch when they enclosed it. It has been used in the hall and on the north wall of the dining room where it replaces a large fireplace and mantel they removed.

This house is one of the largest and most elegant homes on East Broadway and one of the few not converted to apartments. During Thomas Robinson's life it was a social center in Bel Air, and when Cardinal Gibbons visited Bel Air early in the present century, he stayed with Robinson, as legend has it in the southwest chamber on the second floor.



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

This house was built by Thomas Hall Robinson, Attorney General of Maryland between 1923 and 1930. Born at Hickory in 1860, Mr Robinson was a member of the School Board, counsel for the Pennsylvania Railroad, four times delegate to the Democratic National Convention, and twice elected to the State Senate - 1891 and 1901.

Mr & Mrs Cassilly, large family quite fill their pleasant old house.






