DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This imposing two-story house stands on a hill and faces southwest. The structure consists of two parts, the first being the main two-story house and the other being a one and one-half story kitchen addition on the western end. All of the walls are of coursed rubble, with quoined corners and stone lintels and sills for the doors and windows. The main structure is three bays by two and the kitchen wing has three openings that are all located on the northern and southern sides. The western wall is windowless. The sashes are 6 X 6 and the cellar windows of the main house, two on each side, are 3 X 3's. Two 6 X 6 attic windows are located on the eastern and western ends of the main house. A door is located on the north face of the wing, while there are two doors on the south face, one on each section. The main door is on this south embrasure and boasts a six-light transom and four-pane sidelights. Both porches are on the south side and cover the doors there. The kitchen porch is shed-roofed and three-bay on a stone foundation. The main porch is hipped-roof but otherwise similar to the kitchen one. The roof is a slated gable-flank, with box cornices and angled-in eaves underneath. The main house has frieze trim as well. The chimneys are brick, with unusual corceled caps. Two are stationed on either side of the western peak of the roof, and the third is emplaced flush with the western facade of the kitchen. The cellarway is sited on the eastern side of the main house.

South of the main house is the toolhouse, made of the same coursed stone. The door is on the eastern side and there is one small window on each of the other embrasures. It has an asphalt gable-front roof, ringed with a barge-eave. Openings in the upper part of the east-west walls indicated the presence of exposed beams.

The barn is located southwest of the house- an immense, T-shaped structure with the typical gable-flank roof and vertical slat siding. A stone causeway is built up to the eastern face of the barn, made of the same stone as the foundations are.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house was probably built within the first half of the Nineteenth Century. The land where it sits was part of the tracts called "Tripple Union" and "Friendship", which were owned by John Hughes prior to the War for Independence. William B. Stephenson, who headed the drive to build the Masonic Temple in Lapidum, lived here for a short while, but the occupants of most of the property for most of this era were the Cooleys, who operated a local grist and sawmill.

GRG	335 600	Stanley S. Spencer sold the 40 acres, more or less, to Allen C. Waddell in 1949.
GCB	296 226	Albert B. and Richard B. Jaeggin sold the 40 acres, more or less, to Allen C. Waddell in 1946. Prior to 1949, the land was resold to Stanley S. Spencer.
GCB	286 481	In 1945, Elmer B. Dunkak sold 108 acres, more or less, to Albert B. and Richard B. Jaeggin.
GCB	265 229	In 1941, Ida F. Thompson sold the 108 acres, more or less, to Elmer B. Dunkak.

ALJ	66 275	Henry W. Archer, trustee to Evan Thompson sold the land to Thompson in 1890. Archer was appointed trustee after an 1878 equity case involving the Archer and Farnandis trustees v.s. Robert Cooley. The property's origin splits at this juncture.
ALJ	27 169	1. In 1868, A. Lingan Jarrett, trustee, sold 110 acres to Margaret Cooley. Jarrett was made trustee after a court case between David M. Cooley and Corbin Cooley. This parcel consisted of parts of Tripple Union, Friendship and the Mill Property and actually measured 110½ acres.
HD	18 250	A. Lingan Jarrett, trustee, sold an 87 acre, 25 perch portion of Friendship to Sarah Cooley in 1835. This procedure was the result of an equity case involving the estate of the late John Cooley.
JLG	N 60	In 1796, Aquila and Thomas Giles sold an 87½ acre section of Friendship to John Cooley. The former parties were the executors of the estate of Jacob Giles.
ALJ	23 176	2. In 1869, William B. Stephenson sold Ambrose Cooley 40 acres, more or less, of Tripple Union and Friendship.
WHD	19 406	In 1868, Amanda Cooley conveyed to William B. Stephenson parts of Tripple Union and Friendship.
