The Schroll House faces south on the north side of Route 1, just east of the Railroad underpass.

It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two story high, gabled roof (running east-west) frame and brick (covered with stucco) house, resting on a stone foundation, with formstone quoining and a two story high, two bay deep, shed roofed, frame (covered with stucco) section, resting on a stone foundation, constructed along its east wall, and wide brick (covered with stucco) chimney centered into its west wall.

The building features an old stone foundation with large, hand hewn log plate on which log joists are placed.

A building is indicated with the name William Haslup on the 1860 Martennet Map and on the 1878 Hopkin's Atlas in this location, next to the fourteen mile stone to Baltimore, and may very well have been used as a stopping place for travelers.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Schroll House faces south on the north side of Route 1, just east of the Railroad underpass.

It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two story high, gabled roof (running east-west) frame and brick (covered with stucco) house, resting on a stone foundation, with formstone quoining and a two story high, two bay wide, two bay deep, shed roofed, frame (covered with stucco) section, resting on a stone foundation, constructed along its east wall, and wide brick (covered with stucco) chimney centered into its east wall.

SOUTH ELEVATION

The east bay of the south elevation holds the main rectangular, cross paneled entrance door, fronted by a box like, enclosed, frame vestibule, covered by a shed roof aluminum portico, supported by three iron posts. This vestibule rests on the cement landing of a stoop composed of two wide cement steps leading to the entrance. Three second floor windows are vertically aligned to the entrance and two first floor windows, placed in the centre and west bays of this facade.

Windows are rectangular and double-hung, holding six-over-six lights. First floor windows are decorated with formstone keys and formstone sills. The south wall of the shed roofed, east section holds a blocked in, rectangular entrance on the west and a first floor rectangular, double-hung window, similar to those described, on the east, with a small but similar second floor window above.

WEST ELEVATION

The west elevation holds only one aperture, a square, four light attic window on the south side of the "A" framed by the gable roof.

NORTH ELEVATION

The north elevation holds a rectangular, double-hung window, holding six-over-six lights, similar to those described, in the west bay and a rectangular, first-floor entrance in the east bay. Two similar, second floor windows lie above. A basement entrance rests in the west bay. Along this elevation runs a one story high, shed roofed, aluminum, enclosed vestibule. Along the north wall of the east addition has been constructed a two bay wide, one room deep, two story high, shed roofed addition. Its north wall holds a wide stone and brick (covered by stucco) exterior chimney.

EAST ELEVATION

The east elevation holds a central, rectangular attic window. The shed roof of the east addition slopes down sharply. The east wall of this east wing holds a rectangular, double-hung window on the south and a smaller square window on the north.

The east wall of the addition, constructed along the north wall of the east wing, holds two further rectangular windows.

Both the east wing and its addition are believed to have been constructed between 1935 and 1940.

ORIGINAL BUILDING

Originally, the house was just one large room, resting on a stone foundation with loft above. A second floor and attic were then added to the structure.

The foundation is of fieldstone put together with a sand based mortar. It features log joists and a hand hewn log plate around the base of the foundation, upon which the log joists rest. Wide random width pit sawn floor boards can be seen.

INTERIOR

The interior walls have been stuccoed and are all frame except the west wall, which is brick, covered on either side by stucco. It is this wall which holds the deep brick fireplace, faced with stone (now covered by brick veneer).

Located very close to Route 1, just east of the railroad bridge, The Schroll House may once have served as a stopping place of some kind for travelers. Numerous horse shoes have been found on the site and numerous tales of local folklore abound.

In repairing some water damage in the ceiling of the first floor, Mr. Schroll related that he found that the lathing holding the plaster was pegged.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Schroll House is significant to Howard County and the State of Maryland architecturally and historically.

Architecturally, it features an interesting stone foundation upon which is laid a hand hewn log plate, upon which rest log joists. The west wall of the house, which holds the brick and stone fireplace is brick, while the others are of frame, an interesting feature. Mr. Schroll, the occupant of the house, has reported that during repairs to the ceiling of the first floor, he found the lathing put together with pegs. Over the years, the building has been stuccoed to provide a uniformity of exterior wall surface, covering additions along the east wall as well. The formstone quoining, window sills and lintels, which were meant to embellish the building, could easily be eliminated. The second floor, which appears in perfect scale with the house, featuring second floor windows vertically aligned to those below, is also thought by Mr. Schroll to be a later addition. It is his belief that only a one story high building with loft stood here.

Historically, the building may well have been a stop along the Washington Turnpike, located beside the fourteen mile milestone, noted on both the 1860 Martennet Map and the 1878 Hopkin's Atlas. A building noted at this location has the name William Haslup on both maps.

The occupants of the house have found numerous old horse shoes around the site, adding further corroborating evidence to the theory that this may well have been a wayside stop for travelers, and their horse teams.

Located on a tract of land of over five hundred acres, which is zoned for industrial development, with a railroad running through, the house should be placed on the National Register to help insure its continued preservation.

Thanks for the copies of the inventory records of the 14 mile house which you included in your letter of February 13, 1987.



A part of the "Haslup" story

A Bill of Complaint was entered into in the Court of Chancery of the State of Maryland September 24, 1839 by Elizabeth Haslup (widow of Joseph Haslup) on behalf of her infant sons Oliver White Haslup and John William Haslup by their Solicitor Thomas S. Alexander, Esquire, against Mary Haslup (widow of John of William Haslup) Charles G. Haslup, Henry McDade and Eliza (nee Haslup) his wife, Horace Haslup, Charles Griffith and Mary (nee Haslup) his wife and Lewis H. Haslup of Washington, D.C.

The Bill of Complaints charge that sometime during the year 1834 a certain John (of William) Haslup of Anne Arundel County departed this life intestate, seized and possessed valuable real estate in said county consisting in part of the tracts of land called "Food Plenty" "Worthingtons Plains" "Rich Neck" "Mirey Swamp" and "Nelsons Walks" leaving a widow and the above named children, and Oliver White Haslup and John William Haslup who are the children of Joseph Haslup, deceased, the son of John of William Haslup.

They further charge that since the death of John of William Haslup the aforesaid widow and children have been in possession of the real estate left by him and more especially for several years past the said widow and children have had the rents and other profits of the land held by them and appropriating the same to their own use and purposes.

At the July Term of the Court 1843 a Commission was appointed to go enter upon and walk over the land to be surveyed and report back to the Court within sixty days, which they did.

The Commissioners were Jonathan Waters (a Phys) John W. Duvall, Tristram and Noah Dorsey and Zedekiah Moore.

They first laid off the land in 3 distinct parts, then division was made into 7 equal parts having due regard to the quantity and quality without loss or injury to all parties concerned.

- (1) Part of "Food Plenty" and "Worthingtons Plains" tracts consisting of 412 acres.
- (2) Part of "Additions to Mirey Swamp" consisting of 72 acres
- (3) Part of "Rich Neck" and "Nelsons Walks" consisting of 232 acres.

The land was then divided into 7 equal parts as follows:

1. Lewis H. Haslup	63 acres having a value of	\$1,200
2. Oliver White Haslup & John William Haslup	115 acres	1,200
3. Charles G. Haslup	103 acres having a value of	1,200
4. Horace Haslup	131 acres having a value of	1,200
* 5. William S. Haslup	103½ acres having a value of	1,200
6. Henry McDade & wife	80 acres having a value of	1,200
7. Charles Griffith & wife	120½ acres having a value of	<u>1,200</u>
	716 acres having a total value of	\$8,400

* William Samuel Haslup's part included the 14 mile house inherited from his father's property settlement. He lived there until he died in 1884, then his heirs lived there until 1941.

TO: Whom it may Concern:

I would like to purchase a complete set of your records on the "Schroll House" HO-178 Savage Quad, Dist 6. including a print of the house.

Recently, my cousin Betty Haslup Fling visited the library and discovered the Schroll House data but didn't get copies of the entire record. She intended to return for the remaining pages but unfortunately had a heart attack.

Betty and I have been researching our "Haslup Family History" for a number of years. We are descendants of John William Haslup of Anne Arundel and Howard Counties. He owned a plantation of over 700 acres along the old Washington Turnpike now better known as U.S.1. When this road was laid out it cut through the Haslup estate, see Hopkin's Atlas of 1878. Lewis Henry Haslup's part lies on one side of the new road and William Samuel Haslup's is on the other, next to the fourteen mile milestone.

At the fourteen mile milestone was a stage coach-stand kept by John William Haslup which accounts for the many horse-shoes found about the place.

John William Haslup died, intestate, in 1834, his estate was settled by court order 1843. William Samuel Haslup was awarded the tract at the site of the Fourteen mile milestone. He and his family lived there, after his death his daughter Fannie Haslup and her brother and his wife Annie Griffith Haslup lived there. Lloyd died in 1915. Fannie Haslup and Annie Griffith Haslup died one day apart in February 1941. There were no living heirs.

We are delighted to learn about the construction of the house.

AT 1941 this house had been in the Haslup family for over 150 years.

Was the house placed on the National Register? Is Schroll still living there?

If you care to develop the Haslup history of the Fourteen mile house we will be happy to assist you.

HUNTINGTON.

Annapolis Junction.

South of Waterloo, upon the Post Road, were Huntingtown on the east and Guilford on the west. Into this section came Colonel Henry Ridgely, his nephew, Nicholas Dorsey, Orlando Griffith and John Worthington, son of the merchant, who resurveyed upon "Ridgely's Forest" the Worthington homestead, still standing upon "Worthington's Plains," known as the Bowie estate.

Out of this old Griffith house, through a daughter of Gideon White, successor to the estate by purchase, comes Colonel King (of Howard), former member of the Maryland Legislature, attorney-at-law and colonel of Eleventh United States Regiment during the Civil War.

He is upon a neighboring estate of Dr. Jonathan Waters, upon the old Warfield survey, west of the Junction.

Colonel King's grandfather, Gideon White (of Joseph), the miller and surveyor of "White's Contrivance," came down from Peregrine White, the first white child born in Massachusetts.

In this same section, just west of the Junction, was "The Fourteen-mile House," a stage coach-stand kept by Mr. Haslup, grandfather of the two popular Haslup brothers, one an ex-member of the Legislature and the other in charge of the State House. They reside close by this old stand; both have very fine estates along that road.

Huntingtown, the home of Orlando Griffith, west of the railroad and just north of Annapolis Junction, was a Griffith home of historic importance. It is now known as the "White Place."

William Griffith came to Maryland in 1675.

The history of the Griffiths, of Wales, forms an exciting review of the feudal splendor of Griffith, Prince of Wales, but that history is too voluminous for quotation here. Their descendants in Maryland, as will be seen, fought as valiantly for American independence as did their sires in Wales.


