Harwood faces north on the south side of Jennings' Chapel Road, two miles west of its intersection with Route 97. It sits on a hill overlooking corn fields and features a pond northwest of the house.

It is a five bay wide, one room deep, two and a half story high, gabled roof (runing east-west) frame (covered with a German siding) house, resting on a stone foundation, with square brick chimneys inset into its east and west walls, two gabled roof dormer windows on its north facade and a five bay wide, one room deep, two story high, intersecting gabled roof (runing north-south) frame, (covered with German siding) south wing, (consisting of two parts, constructed in two time frames), resting on a stone foundation, with wide, brick, central, interior chimney, creating an "L" plan. A one story high, flat roofed, screened in porch runs along the northern half of this "L" on the west elevation. A deeper, one story high, shed roofed, screened in porch also runs along the southern half of the "L" on the east elevation. What was once a one story high, kitchen porch along the north half of the "L" has been enclosed to provide a "tack" room along the east wall.

Four wide stone steps lead to the stone landing of a two story high, flat roofed portico, held by four square posts and two pilasters, which runs along almost the entire north elevation of the house. Its cornice is decorated with a row of dentils, with a one foot high balustrade running around the perimeter of its roof line.

This facade features a nine light, rectangular, central entrance door, flanked by three vertical side lights and surmounted by a two light transom. Two tall, rectangular windows flank this entrance, with five second floor windows, proportionally scaled and vertically aligned, to those below. These windows are underlined by projecting wooden sills and decorated with shutters. Windows are rectangular and double-hung, with first floor windows holding two-over-two lights and second floor windows holding four-over-four lights.

The two blind dormer windows, constructed to complete the facade, hold rectangular, six light windows, flanked by fluted pilasters, and surmounted by enclosed pediments.

Harwood is a good example of frame, nineteenth century, vernacular architecture in Howard County, Maryland. The additions, which have been made to the house by its present owners in no way destroy its basic integrity. In addition, the property is connected to the Charles Warfield family (of John), early settlers of Howard County, and has been under agricultural cultivation for at least a century.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Harwood faces north on the south side of Jennings Chapel Road, two miles west of its intersection with Route 97. It sits on a hill overlooking corn fields and features a pond northwest of the house.

It is a five bay wide, one room deep, two and a half story high, gabled roof (running east-west) frame (covered with a German siding) house, resting on a stone foundation, with square brick chimneys inset into its east and west walls, two gabled roof dormer windows on its north facade and a five bay wide, one room deep, two story high, intersecting gabled roof (running north-south) frame, (covered with German siding) south wing, (consisting of two parts, constructed in two time frames), resting on a stone foundation, with wide, brick, central, interior chimney, creating an "L" plan. A one story high, flat roofed, screened in porch runs along the northern half of this "L" on the west elevation. A deeper, one story high, shed roofed, screened in porch also runs along the southern half of the "L" on the east elevation. What was once a one story high, kitchen porch along the north half of the "L" has been enclosed to provide a "tack" room along the east wall.

NORTH FACADE

Four wide stone steps lead to the stone landing of a two story high, flat roofed portico, held by four square posts and two

pilasters, which runs along almost the entire north elevation of the house. Its cornice is decorated with a row of dentils, with a one foot high balustrade running around the perimeter of its roof line.

This facade features a nine light, rectangular, central entrance door, flanked by three vertical side lights and surmounted by a two light transom. Two tall, rectangular windows flank this entrance, with five second floor windows, proportionally scaled and vertically aligned, to those below. These windows are underlined by projecting wooden sills and decorated with shutters. Windows are rectangular and double-hung, with first floor windows holding two-over-two lights and second floor windows holding four-over-four lights.

The two blind dormer windows, constructed to complete the facade, hold rectangular, six light windows, flanked by fluted pilasters, and surmounted by enclosed pediments.

THE WEST ELEVATION

The west elevation of the front section of the house holds a first and second floor window, similar to those on the north elevation, in its south bay, with a four light, square, attic window in its north bay.

The west elevation of the original kitchen section (the north half of the "L") holds a central, rectangular, nine light entrance door, flanked by rectangular, double-hung windows, holding two-over-

two lights, similar to those described, vertically aligned and proportionally scaled to two, two-over-two, second floor windows. A one story high, flat roofed, screened in porch runs along this section of the house.

The west elevation of the south half of the "L" holds a rectangular, nine light, St. Andrew's cross paneled entrance door in its south bay and a rectangular, six-over-six light, first floor window in its north bay. Two six-over-six light windows are vertically aligned to these openings.

THE SOUTH ELEVATION

The south elevation of the front section of the house holds two first and second floor, vertically aligned and proportionally scaled, two-over-two light windows, similar to those described, in its two east bays.

The remainder of the south elevation of this section is taken up by the two story high, intersecting, gable roof "L", kitchen-den section of the house.

The south elevation of this latter section holds identical, first and second floor, tripartite windows, composed of a twenty-light, central, picture window, flanked by narrow, rectangular, double-hung windows, holding six-over-six lights.

INTERIOR

The interior features a central hall plan with flanking living room and dining room and a service wing occupying the north side of the "L". A circular staircase in the hall rises to the second floor, featuring turned balusters and mahogany knewel post. Random width floors can be seen in the east upstairs bedroom and the east side of the upstairs hall.

The house has been completely renovated by its present owners, who use the property for horses, agriculture, and as their private residence.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Harwood is a good example of frame, nineteenth century, vernacular architecture in Howard County, Maryland.¹ The additions, which have been made to the house by its present owners, in no way destroy its basic integrity. In addition, the property is connected to the Charles Warfield family (of John), early settlers of Howard County,² and has been under agricultural cultivation for at least a century.³

Explanatory Notes

1. Harwood is a good example of a typical, early nineteenth century, dwelling unit in Howard County, constructed in an "L" plan. It is basically two stories in height, features a gable roof, stone foundation, front building block with central hall and staircase, running the depth of the building, with entrance doors at each end. Public rooms are set on each side of this central hall with central fireplaces on their exterior walls. A service wing off the west side of its south wall forms the basic "L" plan. The building's two major additions consist of a two story high, flat roofed portico, supported by four tall, wooden columns, which runs along the entire north elevation of the house. Other than this porch and the addition of two gabled roof dormer windows, no alteration has been made to the original

window and door placement, which is vertically aligned, proportionally scaled and fully revealed beneath its sheltering portico. A large two bay wide, one room deep, two story high extension has been made to the south service wing, which extends the "L" but maintains the east and west elevations, much as they have always been.

2. The property can be traced back to a member of the Warfield family, a family, whose members have served in both Annapolis and Howard County in positions of trust and authority. This property once consisted of some 635 acres of land, called "Warfield's Connexion Enlarged", the property of a Mr. Charles Warfield (of John) and his wife, Catherine Warfield. They had at least six children, all of whom are mentioned in an equity case of 1857 between a Mr. Mortimer Dorsey and Kitty Warfield. They were: Presley Warfield, Felder Warfield, Rachel Warfield, Kitty Warfield, Amelia Warfield and Eleanor Warfield. The case cites a series of events and their consequences; 1) Charles Warfield died and left his property to his widow and above mentioned children, 2) Presley Warfield, son, died and left several children, who with his mother Catherine, left their share of the estate to Felder Warfield, et al., 3) Felder died and devised to his sister, Kitty Warfield, his undivided interest in his 1/5 part of Presley's estate. In addition he devised his undivided interest in the real estate of his father, Charles Warfield to "Rebecca Dorsey", 4) Rachel Warfield died and devised to Mortimer Dorsey, husband of Rebecca Dorsey, her undivided interest in the estate of her brother, Presley. Due to these complicated proceedings the case in equity was initiated by Mortimer Dorsey and a division made of the 635 acre tract of land. Lot

No. 2 or 226 $\frac{1}{4}$ acres of that tract of land, comprising the house and its outbuildings was sold to Mortimer Dorsey. He died and left six children, the youngest of whom, Rebecca, married Horatio Griffith. They, together had held, with her father, Mortimer, the land and premises, together with other real estate as tenants in common, subject to the right of dower to Ann, widow of Mortimer. Rebecca Griffith held this property until 1900, when she sold it to W. Harvey and Ann E. Davis. It was acquired twenty years later by Joshua N. Warfield, Jr., and after several transactions, became the property of Edwin Warfield, Jr., in 1927, and in 1951 the property of Edwin Warfield, III. Harlow Enterprises, Inc. acquired 144.13 acres of the original Lot No. 1 of the 1857 Equity Case in 1966 and continues to farm the land.

3. Agriculturally, this land has been under cultivation of some sort, for over a hundred years. The plat of 1857 indicates orchards northeast and southwest of the house (See Attachment 5). Not shown on this section of the plat is an area called "Tobacco Spring", indicating that perhaps tobacco was once grown on the property. In the 1900 deed from Rebecca Griffith to W. Harvey Davis, a deed for 226 acres of land and the premises was conveyed to the grantee, "reserving all growing crops". This clause indicated the area was under cultivation. The crops, however, were not stipulated. Today, cornfields lie north of the house and horses are also kept on the property.


