The Simpson Victorian Cottage faces north on the south side of College Avenue, just east of the Taylor Manor Hopsital Buildings.

It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two story high , gabled roof (running east-west) fieldstone (featuring stone quoining, flat stone lintels and projecting stone sills) building, resting on a stone foundation and featuring an intersecting central gable with scalloped barge boards.

This charming cottage is believed to have been constructed by Francis and Mary Ann Hazelhurst, the later of whom inherited this land from her father, Dr. Allen Thomas in 1855.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Simpson Victorian Cottage faces north on the south side of College Avenue, just east of the Taylor Manor Hospital Buildings.

It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two story high, gabled roof (running east-west) fieldstone (featuring stone quoining, flat stone lintels and projecting stone sills) building, resting on a stone foundation and featuring an intersecting central gable with scalloped barge boards.

North Elevation

The north elevation holds a central, rectangular, cross paneled entrance door, flanked by five vertical side lights and surmounted by a three light transom, and flat stone lintel. Double windows rest on either side of the entrance. They are composed of two six-over-four light, rectangular, double-hung windows, decorated with wooden shutters, and vertically aligned to smaller, six-over-three light, second floor windows. A very pleasing fifteen-over-six light, gothic cut, double-hung window is placed over the central entrance, surmounted by an inverted "V" shaped, stone lintel.

East and West Elevations

These are similar, holding two light, rectangular, cross paneled, first floor entrances, surmounted by three light transoms. These entrances are vertically aligned to rectangular, double, second floor windows, composed of two, four-over-four light, double-hung windows.

A square attic vent, surmounted by a flatstone lintel and underlined by a projecting stone sill, are placed in the "A" formed by the gable ends, which also feature scalloped barge boards.

The South Elevation

The east and west bays of the south elevation are similar to those on the north elevation. The ground slopes east, however, so that an additional ground floor is fully revealed at this elevation in the east bay. It holds a six-over-six light, ground floor window. Its central bay holds a six light, ground floor entrance.

South Addition

The central bay of this south elevation is taken up by a three bay wide, one bay deep, one story high, gabled roof (running north-south) frame, south addition, resting on a cinder block foundation.

The west wall of this frame addition holds a stoop, composed of three poured in place cement steps, and landing, flanked by an iron railing. This leads to a rectangular, open bible, cross paneled, entrance door, flanked by six-over-six light, double-hung windows. The ground slopes eastward, providing an open, foundation garage.

The north wall holds a large picture window, flanked by four light windows.

The East Addition

The east wall of the house holds an "L" shaped, intersecting gabled, roof frame, east addition, resting on a cinder block foundation, which is one story high on its north elevation and two stories high on its south elevation.

The west bay of this foundation wall holds a four light, rectangular entrance. Its east bay holds a six-over-six light window.

The west bay of the first floor holds a large, sliding, glass door, which enters onto a frame balcony, around whose perimeter runs an iron railing. A one-over-one light window rests in the east bay. A cupola rests in the center of the gable roof, which runs east-west.

East Elevation of East Addition

The foundation wall at this elevation holds a six-over-six, rectangular, double-hung window, vertically aligned to a similar, first floor, double-hung window.

North Elevation of East Addition

A one bay wide, one bay deep, intersecting gable roof (running north-south) projecting bay takes up the east half of the north elevation. Its north wall holds a square, four light window, while its west wall holds a central, rectangular, nine light entrance door. The remainder of the addition's north wall, holds a six-over-six, rectangular, double-hung window.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Simpson's Victorian Cottage is a notable landmark to Howard County and the State of Maryland as a fine example of Victorian architecture, constructed circa 1863, by Francis and Mary Ann Hazelhurst.¹ Its association with both the Hazelhurst and Thomas families of the County make it significant to the local history of the County.²

HISTORY AND SUPPORT

1. This modestly scaled, stone building is a fine example of the Victorian Cottage architecture of the 1860's. It features fieldstone construction, which enhances its architectural value considerably. It is, however, in its stylistic detail that it is most important. The scale and proportions of the building are pleasing, as well as the double windows found flanking the central entrance. Its scrolled, wooden barge boards on the "A" of the intersecting central gable, as well as the end gables, give it a ginger bread appearance. One of the most charming stone houses of this period, it remains used today as a residence, owned by the Howard County Sanitarium Company.

2. The history of this building is of interest, for it can be traced

back to a deed of partition of the estate of Dr. Allen Thomas, December 31, 1855. (See Title Search). Here it is designated as Lot #4, allotted to Mary Ann Thomas, daughter of Dr. Allen Thomas. Sometime between 1855 and 1863, Mary Ann Thomas married Francis M. Hazelhurst, and turned over all her personal property to her brother, John W. Thomas, "in trust for certain purposes." In addition to real estate, she also named the following slaves, belonging to the said Mary Ann Hazelhurst, to wit: Ann and Harry, her child, Matilda, Delia, and James.

By 1890, both her husband, Francis and her brother, John W. Thomas, had died, so that Holmes Thomas, son of John W. Thomas, became her trustee. At that time she requested that he sell the property to Lennox Birckhead for \$12,000.00. The property remained with this family until 1920, when it was sold to Priscilla Whalen, who held the property for another twenty three years. By 1960, it was acquired by the Howard County Sanitanium Company, who constructed Taylor Manor here, one of the finest and most beautiful of sanitariums.

The history as discussed relates to a neighboring property (Parcel 65). It is unclear at this time who owned this property and what the history entails. Please disregard title search, and Attachments 1, 3, and 4. History may relate to Hazelhurst property off New Cut Road. (Ho-4 33)

Significance, addendum

Originally inventoried as Simpson's Victorian Cottage, it was noted by Nancy Miller of the Maryland Historical Trust that the history of this property was confused with that of another property, HO-433, on New Cut Road, but no attempt was made to correct the history at that time. The current work is meant to remedy that problem.

John R. D. Thomas acquired 436 acres of his father's land in 1855 as part of a partition of property with his siblings, and then added land he acquired from Henry R. Hazlehurst, of "Lilburn", in October 1865. The following month he sold six acres of this land to Eliza D. Porcher (1827-1892) for \$5,000, the high price suggesting that there were already substantial improvements to the property, such as the stone dwelling. It is not clear whether this house was on the Thomas land or on the Hazlehurst land, though this may be splitting hairs since Hazlehurst's first wife was a Thomas and he purchased his land from his in-laws. Further complicating the interpretation is the fact that one of Thomas's sisters was Eliza D. Thomas, who inherited two tracts, of 98 and 3 ¼ acres. It could not be determined whether this was the Eliza who later married Peter Porcher, but the odds are pretty good that it was. John R. D. Thomas had lived at "Glen Ella" (aka "Woodlawn", HO-30) but sold it in 1859 to build a new house closer to Ellicott City, on this land. His house probably became the center of the Howard County Sanitarium in the twentieth century, which burned in November 1923. The 1860 Martenet *Map of Howard County, Maryland* does not include the cottage building, though this cannot be interpreted as proof of its absence. Eliza Porcher is listed in the 1860 census as the 30-year-old wife of Peter Porcher (1828-1889), a 30-year-old farmer from South Carolina, and they already owned real estate valued at \$10,000. Peter Porcher's father was a Charleston doctor who is known to have come to Baltimore in 1849, though this was probably just a visit, since when he died at his son's house near Ellicott City in 1875 he was still living in Charleston; his body was shipped back there for burial. It was asserted at his son's death that the son had come to Howard County around 1849-50, but the list of passengers in 1849 only mentions the doctor, so the son could have already been established here. The Porchers are listed right after the Hazlehursts in the census, suggesting that they were already living in the vicinity of this cottage. The 1878 Hopkins *Atlas of Howard County, Maryland* appears to include this cottage, and appears to place P. Porcher further east of it, right along the railroad tracks. This would suggest that the cottage was a tenant house, and in 1885 Porcher leased a cottage to James Duvall of Baltimore for the summer. Whether it was this building or Porcher's own dwelling house cannot be determined, and Porcher's house near the tracks does not seem to have survived.¹

The house changed hands several times after the death of Eliza Porcher, eventually being acquired by William and Rachel Pilson in 1912 and then passing to their daughter, Rachel Esende, in 1944. The Simpsons acquired the house in 1951 and sold it to Taylor Manor Hospital in 1973. It was used as part of the facilities at that time. The house was demolished in December 2005 as part of the redevelopment of the hospital grounds for housing. Unfortunately, at the time, there was no one with the county documenting historic structures, so no further record of the house was made. There are several color photographs of the house taken by Joetta Cramm in the collections of the Howard County Historical Society.

The house was a rubble stone structure with quoins at the corners and at the edges of the window and door openings. It had cross gables on the front and rear, with jig-sawn bargeboards, and deeply overhanging eaves. There was a triangular-topped window sash in imitation of a Gothic lancet window in the front center bay of the second story, extending up into the cross gable. Some of the windows, especially on the first story, were paired in imitation of casement windows. There was a single chimney in the center of what is believed to have been a single pile plan, and the location of the stairway is not known. Both the general form and the details of the house illustrate the influence of A. J. Downing and his book, *The Architecture of Country Houses*, and are consistent with a date of c. 1855-65. Certainly, these influences continued after that date, but given the known history of the property, this date range seems most plausible. It could have been built as part of Thomas's improvements of the property, though we do not know much about this work, and Hazelhurst's building projects were also grand and are well documented.






