The Miller Farmhouse faces north on the southeast corner of Route 103 and Meadowridge Road. It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two story high, gabled roof (running east-west), frame (covered with asbestos shingles) house, resting on a stone foundation. A one room deep, two bay wide, kitchen wing, resting on a stone foundation extending from the west side of the building's south wall, creates an "L" plan for the house.

Square, thin, corbeled brick chimneys rise from either side of the building's central hall and another similar chimney rises from the center of the kitchen section's south wall.

Fenestration for the house is vertically aligned and proportionally scaled. Windows are double-hung, holding two-over-two lights, underlined by flat wooden sills.

A central, rectangular, nine light north entrance door is flanked by two vertical side lights, surmounted by a two light transom and covered by a one story high, hipped roof, open porch, supported by four scrolled columns.

Constructed in 1890 by Henry Otten, the house has continued to be the home of family members.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Miller Farmhouse faces north on the southeast corner of Route 103 and Meadowridge Road. It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two story high, gabled roof (running east-west), frame (covered with asbestos shingles) house, resting on a stone foundation with central, twin, square, corbeled brick chimneys rising from either side of its central hall.

A one room deep, two bay wide, kitchen wing, resting on a stone foundation, and featuring a square brick chimney in its south wall extends from the west side of the building's south wall. A shed roofed, enclosed porch runs along its east wall. The north side of it provides an entrance vestibule to the kitchen entrance, located in the center of this section's east wall.

Fenestration for the house is vertically aligned and proportionally scaled. Windows are double-hung, holding two-over-two lights, and underlined by flat wooden sills.

The other predominant architectural feature of the house is the central, rectangular nine light entrance door, located in the central bay of the building's north wall. It is surmounted by a two light transom, flanked by two vertical side lights, and covered by a one story high, hipped roof, open porch, supported by four scrolled columns. Another entrance is located in the east bay of the main section's south wall. It is a four light rectangular entrance, surmounted by a one light transom.

The interior features original woodwork and mantle pieces. An interesting cornerstone, marked HO 1890 is located on the south side of the building's east foundation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Miller Farmhouse is significant architecturally to Howard County and the State of Maryland as an example of vernacular architecture in Howard County in the late nineteenth century, and historically as the home of Henry Otten, constructed by him in 1890. A cornerstone on the north side of the building's east wall holds the initials "H.O." with what appears to be the date 1890.

Historically, this property was known as "Good for Little." It consisted of three parcels of land or a total of some 86 acres. Henry J. Otten constructed the house and lived here with his wife, Mary. They raised a family of six children, four daughters (Annie, Mary, Alphonsia, and Elizabeth) and two sons (George and William).

On Henry's death in 1898, all the property was left to Mary, and upon her death, to their son William F. Otten, with the following stipulation to his son: "said son, shall within two years after the death of my wife, pay to each of his sisters . . ., and his brother . . . \$500.00 . . ." (Wills 4-238)

William F. Otten and his wife Sophia conveyed the property to William's brother, George in 1911 for \$5,800. (91-241). Twenty years later, George, who remained unmarried, conveyed the three parcels of "Good for Little" to his sister, Alphonsia, who married Frank J. Miller. (142-439) It was they who gave their name to this intersection, commonly known as "Miller's Corner."

Frank and Alphonsia raised a large family of six daughters (Margaret m Roy Shilling, Katharine m John C. Duvall, Regina m Woodrow Tipton, Barbara m Stewart Wilderson, Mary m Daniel Wilderson, and M. Ethel as of 21 May 1949 remained unmarried), and four sons (Gerald, Frank, Leo and Arthur). Leo and Arthur took a keen interest in the operation of the dairy farm, while their father acted as a deputy sheriff for Howard County. Upon his death in 1946, and the death of his wife, Alphonsia in 1948, the remaining family, together, conveyed the farm to Leo and Arthur, who had been operating it, "subject to reservation to George H. Otten to have a home on the premises . . . for and during the period of his natural life."

Today the farm remains in the hands of the wives of Arthur and Leo and one of their sons is living in the old farm house, the fourth generation to reside there. The house is located on the old road to Elkridge Landing and is among the oldest roads in Howard County, noted on both the 1860 Martennet Map and the 1878 Hopkin's Atlas. Meadow Ridge Road does not appear on the 1860 Map, but was constructed by 1878, when it was indicated on the Hopkin's Atlas.

Architecturally, the Miller Farmhouse provides a well preserved example of a vernacular building of the 1890 period in Howard County. The regularity of its interior central hall plan suggests a certain formality on the part of the builder. The building's appearance is otherwise quite devoid of stylistic detail with the exception of the nine light, central entrance door, characteristic of the Victorian style which was affecting American architecture at this time.

For these reasons, the building is of historic and architectural significance and should be placed on the National Register of Historic Places, should its owners so wish, as well as the State Critical Areas Program and any local landmark ordinance which the citizens of Howard County may wish to initiate.


