DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hill House is a simple rectangular building with remarkable sawn ornament on the front porch.

Three bays 28' 10" wide and, two 16' 6" deep, the main house has a gable roof with its ridge set parallel to the street. There are two gable dormers in the front slope; they have two over two sash, horizontally boarded cheeks and faces with sawn-work cut to resemble pilasters. The roof has overhanging eaves with cyma recta crown mold. There are two small casement windows in each attic gable. To the rear is an ell which also has a gable roof.

Windows in the main house have two over two sash, plain trim and plain projecting wooden sills. They are evenly spaced in the front facade. The main entry has three pane transom lights and side lights. The side light panel has bolection moldings as does the four panels of the door. The upper door panels are round beaded. This door assembly is enriched by carved dentils on the transom bar.

The chief decorative feature of this little house is its beautiful front porch, which has a shallow hip roof supported on flat columns. These are made up of panels of sawn-work in a foliated pattern set in frames. There are also large flat bracketts.

The building is frame, covered with aluminum siding.

Inside is a nicely proportioned right angle stair set in a wide side hall. Like most other stairs of this period this one has an octagonal walnut newel post, turned balusters, and an open string.

In the living room (the only first floor room in the main house) is a tall turn of the century mantle with a high shelf supported by plain columns with acanthus-leaf capitols. There is a mirror beneath this shelf that has a frame of delicate egg and dart carving. Above the fireplace opening is another shelf on acanthus leaf bracketts. The mantle is probably oak and originally had a Latrobe stove. In all likelihood, it replaces an earlier mantle.

The trim in the main house is about 4" wide and made up of a bead-fascia-ogee and bevel-fillet composite. Doors have four shallow raised panels and agee and bevel applied panel moldings.


