

CARTER HOUSE (K-426)
Lynch, Maryland
(ca 1880)

The Carter House is a three-bay, two story house with a steep gable roof broken by a narrow central gable. The house is frame, covered with medium-width weatherboarding, and rests on a brick foundation. This little building in the village of Lynch is an urban adaptation of the central gable house type, narrower and taller in proportion to its country cousins. Its side hall plan is also more commonly seen in the towns and villages of Kent than in the country side. The unusual double gable Coleman House (K-424) is located just down the street from this building.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Carter House is a three-bay, two story house with a steep gable roof broken by a narrow central gable. The house is frame, covered with medium-width weatherboarding, and rests on a brick foundation.

The main house has a side-hall plan and a rear ell which has been extended with modern additions. Across the front is a handsome three bay front porch with square chamfered columns and sawn wooden brackets and pendants.

Windows have 2 over 2 sash in plain frames, and louvered shutters. The doorway has a door with round-headed upper panels, a transom light and side lights. In the gables of the main house are small tudor arched sash windows.

Painted white with red shutters and a grey asphalt shingle roof, the building is very well maintained.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

A steeply pitched central gable was a favorite design motif of the 1870's and 1880's on the Eastern Shore and other parts of Maryland. Usually in Kent County these central gables are not true "cross gables" rear wings are usually assymmetrically located and covered by a roof with a different pitch. Rather three central gables are almost like dormers with their main purpose to provide light to the upper story.

This little building in the village of Lynch is an urban adaptation of the central gable house type, narrower and taller in proportion to its country cousins. Its side hall plan is also more commonly seen in the towns and villages of Kent than in the country side. The unusual double gable Coleman House (K-424) is located just down the street from this building.




