Sited on a hillside overlooking the Chester River, Kentmere is an early 20th century house which reflects the influence of the Colonial Revival style on domestic architecture. It is a 1-1/2 story gambrel roofed building with an L-plan and central entrance/stair hall. A full width front porch is covered by the main house roof. The second story front is lighted by 4 large gable dormers.

Colonial Revival sprang from an interest in American Colonial buildings that was initiated by the Centennial Celebration of 1876. A favorite motif of colonial revival structures is the gambrel roof sometimes with flaring eaves as in this house. Tall, prominent chimneys; shingled walls, and roofs; and sweeping porches are all popular features of the style that are seen in this house.

Building Form and Material

1. Size - Main Section: 1½ stories, 4 bays wide, 3 bays deep
Wing: 1½ stories, 2 bays wide, 3 bays long
2. Plan type - Central Hall L-plan with rear ell
3. Roof type - Main section: broad gambrel

4. Chimney - Location: Major chimney projects from northern gable

Roofs: Shingle in roof & gambrel ends (wing, the same)

Building Elements and Details

1. Doors - Main entry: Center of river facade - paneled Dutch door.
Secondary entry: Rear of wing.
2. Windows - Main section: type - double hung
lights - 4/4
details - broad, flat trim and plain sills.
There is a broad bay that projects into the front porch.
shutters - louvered, wooden
Wing: type - same
details - Some smaller windows in rear of wing to light utility area.
shutters - wooden louvered
3. Dormers - 4 gable dormers with overhanging eaves across river front of building. There are gambrel dormers with 2 4/4 sash in the slopes of the wing.
4. Roof details - Main section: Deep cornice with composite moldings.
The main house roof has a kick at the eave.
Wing: Similar but smaller in scale.
5. Porch - Front porch is covered by the main-house roof. It is supported by 6 slender round columns.

6. Color - Current: Brown shingles/white trim and weatherboards/
black shutters except pale blue shutters under porch.
7. Other - The colonial gambrel feeling of the building is emphasized
by a kick at the eave of the main house roof.

Interior Description

1. Plan type - Central Hall.
2. Major stair - Dog leg with simple details - square newel and
balusters.
3. Major trim - Windows/doors: Reeded
Baseboards: Plain
4. Major doors - 5 panel.
5. Floors - Narrow pine.
6. Walls/ceiling finishes - Plaster.

Outbuildings/Site Description

1. Major outbuildings - Original use: Tenant house.
Material: Frame.
2. Site Description - To reach Kentmere the lane crosses an inlet
shaded by trees. The house overlooks a spacious lawn bordered
by natural woods. The lawns overlook the Devil's Reach section
of the Chester River.
3. Views to/from site - Kentmere has a view of the Chester River
from the dock of the Country Club to the Chester River Bridge,
including Chestertown. The buildings along with Piney Grove is
one of the major old houses near Chestertown clearly visible
from the river.


