Cedar Point Farm Site
Eastern Neck Island
Patented 1659

Cedar Point Farm is located on the southern point of land which extends into the Chester River from Eastern Neck Island. Part of the original Wickcliffe grant which was first patented in 1659 and resurveyed for Joseph Wickes in 1680, the farm descended first to his son, Joseph Wickes, Jr. and remained in the family for roughly another one hundred years.

In 1804, Richard B. Mitchell, a Wickes descendant, acquired the farm. In the Tax Assessment of 1852, a "Brick House & other Buildings in Tolerable repair" is mentioned. Mitchell did not live here, but resided at Bowlingly in Queenstown, Queen Annes County, where he was a prominent businessman. He did, however, have 11 slaves living on the farm on Eastern Neck Island.

In 1879, Cedar Point Farm was purchased by Benjamin Sappington, whose wife, Frances, was a Wickes. It remained in that family until 1928 when it became known as Cedar Point, Inc.

The house mentioned in the 1852 Tax Assessment was demolished in 1933 by the owner of the Cedar Point Gunning Club. It remained a private gunning club until the early 1960's, when it, along with the remainder of the island was acquired by the United States Government as a nature preserve.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Near the south end of the paved road on Eastern Neck Island is an historical marker in a thin grove of trees within site of the bay and mouth of the Chester River. The historical marker commemorated the site of Wickliffe, the first patented tract on Eastern Heck Island, Joseph Wickes, its patentee and Lambert Wicks, one of his descendants who was an important naval figure in the American Revolution.

The marker reads as follows:

"3/3/96 to ENI - 96661 END - 96707 = 46 MILES -

Wickliffe

Maj. Joseph Wickes who settled on Eastern Neck Island c. 1658 was Chief Justice of Kent County before 1674. The Court met at Wickliffe, his home here (no longer standing). By 1680 he had acquired 864 Acres. The southern half of the Island, which he held until his death in 1692. His Great-grandson Capt. Lambert Wickes, who spent his early years here, served with distinction in the Continental Navy, was lost at sea with his Sloop-of-war Reprisal Oct 1, 1727."

Although the marker is on Wickliffe, the first inhabitant, Joseph Wickes, as well as his descendant, Lambert, actually lived on that section of Wickliffe north of the marker.

The Granger family may have been responsible for constructing the "Brick House" mentioned in the 1852 tax assessment.


Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

"Cedar Point Farm" is a name derived from the southern point of land on Eastern Neck Island which extends into the Chester River. It is part of the original Wickliffe grant dating from 1659 and re-surveyed in 1680 for Joseph Wickes. After Joseph Wickes died (1698), the land was divided between his two sons Samuel and Joseph, Jr. in 1701. This portion of Wickliffe was taken by Joseph Wickes, Jr. and it remained in his descendants, the Grangers until 1804, when title was passed to Richard B. Mitchell. From that period through 1879 it remained in the ownership of two or three generations of Mitchells, who were Wickes descendants.

C.J.B. Mitchell was listed as owner of "Wickliff and Market Place Recovered" in the 1852 tax assessment. On this 554 acre farm was a "Brick House & other Buildings in Tolerable repair." Mr. Mitchell did not live on the Island but judging from the 1877 Atlas, he may have used Cedar Point for gunning purposes. He lived across the River at Bowlingly in Queenstown and was a very prominent businessman in Queen Anne's County. He did, however, have 11 slaves living on the Island.

In 1879 Cedar Point Farm was purchased by Benjamin Sappington, whose wife Frances, was a Wickes. It remained in that family until 1928 when it became known as Cedar Point, Inc. The house mentioned in the 1852 tax assessment was demolished in 1933 by the owner of the Cedar Point gunning club. WICKLIFFE

MAJ. JOSEPH WICKES, WHO SETTLED ON EASTERN
NECK ISLAND, C. 1634, WAS CHIEF JUSTICE OF
KENT COUNTY BEFORE 1674 THE COURT MET AT
WICKLIFFE, HIS HOME HERE (NO LONGER STANDING).
BY 1680 HE HAD ACQUIRED 804 ACRES, THE
SOUTHERN HALF OF THE ISLAND WHICH HE HELD
UNTIL HIS DEATH IN 1692. HIS GREAT-GRANDSON
CAPT. LAMBERT WICKES, WHO SPENT HIS EARLY
YEARS HERE, SERVED WITH DISTINCTION IN THE
CONTINENTAL NAVY, WAS LOST AT SEA WITH HIS
SLOOP-OF-WAR BEBRISAL, OCT. 1, 1777.
