9. Description: This four bay, two and a half story house is set back a considerable distance from Prescott Road and faces northwest. It is guarded by a vigilant and fearsome German shepherd. This frame and possibly log house is now covered by white asphalt siding. The northwest (front) porch has a half-hipped roof supported by 5 wooden columns. The porch is now enclosed by plywood panels. There are six-over-six double-hung windows. The house has a gable roof covered by black raised seam metal.

10. Significance: The Perry Browning house is representative of 18th century farm houses that once dotted upper Montgomery County.

The land on which it sits was once part of a large grant called the "Resurvey of Wildcat Spring". Brice Thomas Beall Worthington owned 1,498 acres of this tract in 1783, property that the assessments for that year called "wooded thin stony saplin land". In 1785 he bought more of this land from Joshua Cacil for a little over 55 pounds. The purchase was described as "containing 100 acres of land with all the Houses buildings, orchards Gardens woods and fields." When Worthington died he passed along this property to his daughters Sarah, Polly, and Henrietta. In 1814 they sold 312 3/4 acres and the house (presumably a tenant farmers dwelling) to George Wolfe, who owned many other tracts and houses in the area, including the mill down the road.

The Perry Browning family owned this property from 1830-1897.

The house is now within Little Bennett Regional Park.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This four bay, two and a half story house is set back from the road and faces northwest.

Built on fieldstone foundations, the frame and possibly log structural system of the house is now covered by white asbestos siding. The northwest (front) porch has a half-hipped roof supported by five wooden columns. Three poured concrete steps lead to the porch. The porch has been enclosed by plywood panels which completely obscure the first level. The glass and wooden paneled northwest (front) door was still visible.

The house has six-over-six double hung windows. At the second level of the northwest elevation there are three pairs of six-over-six windows.

The gable roof is covered by black raised seam metal. At the northeast and southwest gable ends there are massive exterior fieldstone chimneys with brick stacks above the second level.

The Perry Browning house is representative of 18th century farm houses that once dotted upper Montgomery County.

The land on which it sits was once part of a large grant called the "Resurvey of Wildcat Spring". Brice Thomas Beall Worthington owned 1,498 acres of this tract in 1783, property that the assessments for that year called "wooded thin stony saplin land". In 1785 he bought more of this land from Joshua Cacil for a little over 55 pounds. The purchase was described as "containing 100 acres of land with all the Houses buildings, orchards Gardens woods and fields."² When Worthington died he passed along this property to his daughters Sarah, Polly, and Henrietta. In 1814 they sold 312 3/4 acres and the house (presumably a tenant farmers dwelling) to George Wolfe,³ who owned many other tracts and houses in the area, including the mill down the road.

After George Wolfe passed away, several other people owned the property. In 1830 Perry Browning purchased 157 acres,⁴ and settled in the house and farmed the land. For three generations the farm stayed in the Browning family until 1897 when Perry's grandson Charles put the property on the market.⁵

During the 20th century the house and lands passed through many hands until the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission purchased the property in the late 1960's. Most of the old farm land has been allowed to return to its natural state and the house is now within the boundaries of the proposed Little Bennett Regional Park.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a long, narrow structure that has been built in several parts. It probably consists of two joined log houses, but it has been altered and covered-up so much it is difficult to tell at present. The main (west) facade actually has three bays of double windows, and the entrance is near the center, but in the east section. The "A" roof is steeply pitched and gives some hint as to the age of the house. Also, there are massive stone fireplace chimneys on the north and south exterior walls. The present chimney-stacks are replacements of modern brick. The (east) rear of the house has several irregularly-placed windows on the second story, and picture windows in the north and south ends of the first floor.

There is a low, cinderblock wing that extends from the NE corner of the house. The porch on the front (west) facade runs the length of the house and has been enclosed. Most of the house is now covered with asbestos shingles.
