DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This handsome two story frame house has been renovated by the present owners. It is the center of a small working farmstead.

According to Louise Onley, this house belonged to her great grandfather, Thomas A. Onley, and later was owned by her father, Daniel Thomas Onley. Originally the house consisted of only the principal two story block. The arrangement of the bays in the facade was similar to that of today: a door centrally located, flanked by a window on either side. The double hung sashes had two over two lights. Along the facade of the house extended a shed porch.

In plan the house originally consisted of two rooms down and three up. Downstairs were the kitchen and living room, Mrs. Onley remembers. Upstairs were bedrooms. She was born in 1916, and recalls that during her youth, her father added the two rooms down and two rooms upstairs to the back of the house, along with the back porch.

Stove flues served the original block, instead of a chimney with fireplace. The new kitchen in back was also served by stove flues. Underneath the original portion of the house was a cellar.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is the only one of the "old houses" of the Jackson family in the Blacktown community that remains standing, other than the Lockett house. Its plan and construction were basically similar to those of the other houses in Black landowning communities in the late nineteenth century and early twentieth century.

According to the deed, EBP 32/253, Thomas A. Jackson purchased 12.5 acres from John W. and Ellen Darby in 1884 for the price of \$425. The house was most likely built by him at this time since it was not the Darby's home and was too fine to have been a tenant house. Jackson became the patriarch of the Black community that developed in Blacktown. His son Daniel Thomas acquired ^{and} adjacent to his on Slidell, and his grandson Daniel Thomas acquired this house. His great grandchildren and great great grandchildren continue to live in the community.

According to Louise Onley, her great grandfather Thomas A. Jackson had been a slave, but she did not know where he had been a slave. According to the 1867 census of freed slaves in Montgomery, there was a Thomas Jackson (sic) who had been a slave of Dr. Nicholas Brewer, and a Thomas Jackson who was a slave of Dr. William Brewer. The former was 27 years old in 1867, and the latter 26. Either one could possibly be the Thomas Jackson, the future owner of this house.


