This two story frame house was probably built as the residence of a white landowning family. In plan it originally contained two rooms down and two up, and had a three bay facade. In 1923, the house was purchased by a young Black couple from the community, and they extensively improved the house inside and outside, almost doubling the size.

 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story frame house stands on the east side of Slidell Road. Though the house has not been well maintained in recent years, its form shows that it was once a handsome dwelling and considerable care was given to its appearance. Dorothy Luckett Curtis, who lives nearby, was raised in this house, and she has furnished the following description of the evolution of the house.

Originally the house consisted of two rooms, a principal block with a one story section attached to the back length. The frame was covered with weatherboards. The facade consisted of three bays: a door centrally located, flanked by a window on either side. In plan, the interior consisted of two rooms down and two up. The section along the back length consisted of a kitchen and bedroom.

In the mid 1930s the house was drastically "improved". For the purpose the Lucketts hired the local carpenter George Ellison, the same carpenter who constructed the new house for the Talley family in Turnertown. He added a full two story bay window to the southern gable end, removed the brick stove flue that had been built along the southern gable end, and rebuilt it in the front length at the junction of the bay window and the principal block. Along the front of the house he built a shed porch with turned posts and bannisters. In the back of the house he enlarged the kitchen to a full two stories, and doubled its depth. He added a "closed-in porch" behind the original section and built another bedroom above. Next to the bedroom, he added a sun porch. Along the new rear length, he built a shed porch. The result of these enlargements was an attractive home, larger than most of those of rural Black landowners.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to the deed 332/62, William and Gladys Lockett purchased this tract of 2.20 acres from Charles J. and Mamie R. Kuster in 1923. Dorothy Curtis recalls that the Kuster family was white, so the Locketts were the first known Black owners.

Dorothy Curtis says that her father was raised in the White Grounds community near Boyds, and her mother in the Jackson home here in the Blockettown community. Her maternal grandparents were Daniel Thomas and Bell Jackson, and their house has been included in this survey. Her paternal grandparents were the Locketts from White Grounds, and their house has been surveyed too. Neither home is still standing. The house that her parents purchased reflect their upward mobility.

Mrs. Curtis says that her father worked for the county sanitation commission and did construction work, such as laying pipes. During the occupancy of the Lockett family, the dwelling was a "nice home" in appearance. Dorothy Curtis recalls, her mother was "always doing something around the house to keep it attractive".

According to the deed JA 2/89, this property of 2 acres was purchased by Mary Ellen Kuster from John W. and Ellen Darby in 1886 for fifty dollars. The low price suggests there was not a dwelling on the property, so the house was probably built soon thereafter. The tract had been a portion of the larger farm of 140 acres owned by John W. Darby.
