This handsome two-story frame house with a typical three-bay facade was constructed by the black carpenter, Arthur Gibson, on land acquired by his grandfather in the late 1800's. Gibson was a skilled jack-of-all-trades and built several black families' houses in Clarksburg and Boyds, three of which remain standing.

 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This handsome two story frame house with gable roof stands on the east side of Clarksburg Road. Its facade is oriented towards the road. The length of the house contains three bays; the door centrally located, flanked by two windows. The house is one bay in depth. The facade is sheltered by a shed porch and the frame is covered with overlapping weatherboards. The eaves are boxed, and the corners of the house are accented with trim boards. (In plan, the interior consists of two rooms down and two up).

The house has been modernized in recent years, however, the older photograph which has been copied as part of this survey, shows its earlier appearance. Refer to that photograph for descriptions of its earlier and more original appearance. To the rear of the house has been added a small shed, a kitchen apparently. None of the outbuildings remain except for a small building which, according to Arthur Randolph, the Gibsons lived in when this house was being built after the original house burned in c. 1918.

The environs of the house have changed considerably since its time of occupancy. The land has now been purchased by the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission. Behind the house is a pond and to north of the house is a small picnic area. Across from the house (west) is a cluster of houses. These homes are the residences of the descendants and relatives of the Gibson family who have built their homes on property that Arthur Gibson purchased in earlier years.

SPECIFIC DATES 1912 BUILDER/ARCHITECT ARTHUR GIBSON

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to the deed 212/186, this tract of 1.75 acres was purchased by Arthur M. and Ella M. Gibson from George T. Williams in 1910. It was part of the tract known as "Tomahawk". Since Gibson bought the property for five hundred dollars, there must have been a house already built. This is confirmed by Arthur Randolph, the Gibsons' nephew. According to him, the original house burned and his uncle built this house on the same foundations.

According to Randolph, his uncle was a skilled carpenter and a proud man. This is shown in the photograph of him, which was copied. Enclosed with this report is a letter to the newspaper from Gibson denouncing the development of Jim Crow (segregation) in Maryland. This letter reveals Gibson's strong of self.

The Gibson family was part of the extended family of Black landowners along Clarksburg Road, north of Clarksburg. Arthur's wife was Ella Mae Hackey; her brother was William L. Hackey, a landowner, and her sister, Dora Randolph, married Robert Randolph another landowner along Clarksburg Road. Gibson's grandfather was George T. Williams, one of the first Trustees of the John Wesley Church in Clarksburg.

There are four houses that were built by Arthur Gibson that still remain standing. One is the Zelma Foreman house, which has been recorded as part of the "Foreman Hill houses". It was built in the early 1930s as an attachment to an older house that was moved to the site. He assisted his brother-in-law, William L. Hackey, in the construction of his house on Clarksburg Road. In 1947 he built a house for James Green next to the Rachel Mason house in Clarksburg. After the disasterous fire that destroyed his own house in c. 1918, Gibson constructed a small house for his family to live in, while he built a larger home on the very same foundations of the first house. Except for the home of James Green, all of these homes built by Gibson have been recorded as examples of his work.


