DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story house stood on the south side of Rt. 355 on property behind that of the William and Rachel Mason family. The house is now gone. According to Ethel Foreman, who was raised in Clarksburg, this house was a two story frame dwelling, resembling those of other Black landowners in the community. Examples which have been photographed in this survey include the homes of Arthur Gibson, Maurice Mason, Warner Wims and John Henry Wims. See photographs of those sites.

The house consisted of two sections: a principal block and a two story ell attached to the rear length. The principal block was three bays in length and one in depth. The ell was one bay in length and in width. The principal block contained the living room and dining room downstairs with bedrooms above. The stove flue was located in center of the house. In the ell was the kitchen with bedroom above. There was no front porch, though a back porch did shelter the back of the ell.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Though this house no longer stands, it is another example of the type once built and occupied by rural Black landowners in Montgomery County near the turn of the 20th century. This type was in sharp contrast to the small houses of Black farm tenant families of the same area and to the houses of Black landowners in earlier decades of the 19th century.

According to the deed **TD 22/37**, this property was purchased by Samuel Moore from *Charles Mason* in 1902. The house was probably built near that time.

According to the deed, TD 22/37, Robert Samuel Moore was married to Atlanta Moore, confirming the account given by Ethel Foreman. In that deed they purchased one acre of land. According to Miss Foreman the Moore house resembled the home of John Henry Wims, which is still standing in Clarksburg (see photographs of that house, M: 13-10-17.).
