Main House

The Wilcox House is a heavily altered two-story frame gable front and wing building with clapboard walls (covered by aluminum siding) and has a moderate pitched rolled metal roof. The two-story building has a general overall L-plan and was built as two I-house sections around 1859 and 1905. According to county equity records, the house was a four room log house as late as 1905 when a substantial frame addition was built to create a more fashionable folk Victorian house.

The principle elevation of the house faces southwest toward Bell Road and has a gable front and three-bay wing facade with symmetrical ranks of four-over-four windows on the first and second stories with green batten shutters. The first level has a simple central entry with a one story hipped roofed porch, supported by simple posts ornamented with scrollwork brackets, that infills the L on the south elevation.

The remaining facades of the house also have four-over-four sash windows placed in largely symmetrical ranks throughout the building with a few two-over-two windows added to the rear facade, and attic windows at the gable ends. Large two story and one story shed additions extend across the rear of the building. The south side of the house has a large two story latticed wooden staircase that accesses the second floor of the house since the building has been partitioned into separate living units. The house has a central internal chimney with brick corbeling and on the north side there is an exterior irregularly coursed stone chimney base and a brick stove flue.

Burton Family Cemetery

Adjacent to the Wilcox/Beall House is a small family cemetery with 23 plots laid out in rows on a rectangular lot. Most of the stones are simple granite pylons without inscriptions and there are several footmarkers with only initials. There are two prominent headstones in the yard and these are simple double markers of white granite set on granite sills. The inscriptions on these gravestones indicate that Isaac (died 1873) and Keturah Burton (died 1877) and William (1787-1832) and Susan Burton (1783-1860) are interred here.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

The Wilcox/Beall House, built in sections ca. 1859 and 1905, has been extensively remodeled and expanded in the recent past. The house lacks sufficient integrity to represent a distinctive type, period or method of design and construction and has minimal local architectural or historical significance. The house, a gable end and wing frame building type, was a popular dwelling usually built in the Gothic Revival or Queen Anne styles by Montgomery County's farmers in the late-nineteenth and early twentieth century.

The Burton family cemetery is intact and continues to mark the family's contribution to the founding of Burtonsville. Isaac Burton was the town's first postmaster when the small community, located at the intersection of Old Columbia Road and the road to Sandy Spring, was known as "Burton's." The cemetery neither derives significance from the graves of persons considered to be of major importance to eastern Montgomery County's history nor does it possess distinctive funerary design features or associations with important historic events.

Chain of Title/Owner Information:

The first log section of the house was probably built by farmer William Wilcox ca. 1859 after he purchased the 72 acre tract, identified as parts of "Bachelor's Adventure," "Bear Bacon," and Snowden's Third Addition to his Manor," from Joseph and Catherine Soper for \$648. The Sopers had purchased the land in 1853 from the Burton family, the founders of the village of Burtonsville. William Wilcox conveyed 25 1/2 acres to Richardson Wilcox for \$306 in 1867. The remaining 46 1/2 acres with improvements including a weatherboarded four room log house, wagon shed, and spring house were sold at public auction in 1893 when William Wilcox defaulted on the mortgage. The house was purchased by Francis Thomas for \$303.25 and almost immediately resold to Catherine Duvall. At her death in 1905 the house was sold as part of the settlement of her estate to Frederick W. Kruhm for \$150. Kruhm probably made a substantial frame addition to the building in 1905 and resold the property to John B. Beall for \$400. His son John T. Beall inherited the farm at his father's death. In 1950 the current owners, Dorothy Beall Brown and her husband Edward Brown, acquired the house and approximately six acres of land from her parents John and Julia Beall.

The William Wilcox Farmhouse is significant as an example of vernacular architecture typical to that constructed in Montgomery County from the mid-nineteenth through the early twentieth centuries. The house combines the elements of early log and later frame construction. The house is believed to have been built by William Wilcox following his land purchase date of February 1, 1859. Originally the Wilcox house rested on 72 acres, parts of land tracts referred to as "Bachelor's Adventure", "Bear Bacon" and "Snowden's Third Addition to His Manor." The property was conveyed to Wilcox by Joseph and Catherine Soper for \$648.¹ The Sopers had purchased the land in January of 1853 from the Burton family, the founders of the town in which the site is located (Burtonsville).²

In December of 1867, William Wilcox conveyed 25 1/2 acres of his total 72 acres to Richardson Wilcox for \$306.³ The house and remaining 46 1/2 acres, improved by a four room log house, weather-boarded, a small barn, stable, corn house, wagon shed and spring house were sold at a public auction in 1893. This occurred after William defaulted on his mortgage to Samuel Thomas. Maurice Talbott, the appointed trustee, sold the Wilcox farm to Francis Thomas for \$302.25.⁴

In September of 1893, Thomas sold the "Wilcox Farm" to Catherine Duvall.⁵ Then in January of 1905 Catherine died. Since there were too many heirs to divide up the property in a manner that would have been advantageous to all, Frank Higgins was appointed trustee to sell the farm. The highest bidder, Frederick W. Kruhm, purchased the 46 1/2 acre farm, still improved by the four room log house and numerous outbuildings, for \$150.⁶

Kruhm held on to the farm for less than one year, selling it in September of 1905 to John B. Beall for \$400.⁷ A substantial frame addition was made to the original log structure about 1905. Upon his death, Beall passed the house and the 46 1/2 acres on which it sat to his son, also named John Beall. Then in October of 1950, John and his wife Julia conveyed the house to their daughter Dorothy and her husband Edward Brown, the present owners.⁸


